A bill to be entitled

An act relating to criminal justice system interviews of persons with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability; providing a short title; encouraging the use of certain state-of-the-art digital devices for the purposes of identification and notification; requiring that certain professionals with experience in treating, teaching, or assisting persons with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability be present during an interview of a person with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability conducted by specified persons; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. This act may be cited as "The Wes Kleinert Fair Interview Act."

Section 2. (1) The Legislature encourages the use of state-of-the-art digital devices, such as bracelets, necklaces, and pocket cards that are similar to those kept upon the person of individuals who have certain medical conditions or age-related disabilities, to assist law enforcement, correctional, or other public safety officials and other concerned persons in quickly identifying individuals who have been diagnosed with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability and notifying the family members, caregivers, and primary intervention professionals of such individuals when a crisis

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occurs.

(2) A psychiatrist, psychologist, mental health counselor, special education instructor, clinical social worker, or related professional, each of whom must have experience treating, teaching, or assisting patients or clients who have been diagnosed with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability, or must be certified in special education with a concentration focused on persons with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability, must be present to assist a law enforcement officer, a correctional officer, or another public safety official during all interviews of an individual with autism, an autism spectrum disorder, or a related developmental disability, whether the individual being interviewed is the victim of a crime, the suspect in a crime, or the defendant formally accused of a crime or is otherwise involved in the criminal justice system.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2016.
