(c) If the court issues an order of no contact, comply 20 21 with the order. An order of no contact is effective immediately 22 and enforceable for the duration of the pretrial release or until it is modified by the court. Communicating orally or in any written form, either in 31 person, telephonically, electronically, or in any other manner, 32 either directly or indirectly through a third person, with the 33 victim or any other person named in the order. If the victim and the defendant have children in common, at the request of the 34 35 defendant, the court may designate an appropriate third person 36 to contact the victim for the sole purpose of facilitating the 37 defendant's contact with the children. However, this 38 subparagraph does not prohibit an attorney for the defendant, 39 consistent with rules regulating The Florida Bar, from 40 communicating with any person protected by the no contact order 41 for lawful purposes.

42 2. Having physical or violent contact with the victim or43 other named person or his or her property.

3. Being within 500 feet of the victim's or other named
person's residence, even if the defendant and the victim or
other named person share the residence.
