WHEREAS, these exotic invasive species are reproducing at uncontrolled rates because this state lacks the natural predators that would limit the ability of these exotic invasive species to multiply uncontrollably, and

WHEREAS, the proliferation of these exotic invasive species in South Florida threatens the Florida Everglades and the native species that live there, and

WHEREAS, many national parks throughout the United States face similar threats to their ecosystems from exotic invasive species, and

WHEREAS, allowing the hunting of exotic invasive species would be an effective measure to reduce these threats, and

WHEREAS, additional research into hunting and other methods of exotic invasive species control may reveal additional or more effective methods to control or eliminate such species, NOW, THEREFORE,
