A bill to be entitled

An act relating to charitable gaming; amending s. 546.10, F.S.; authorizing Type C amusement games or machines to be operated at the premises of a veterans' service organization under certain conditions; creating s. 849.0932, F.S.; providing definitions; authorizing certain organizations to conduct poker tournaments under certain circumstances; providing requirements and restrictions for such tournaments; prohibiting persons under 18 years of age from participating or being involved in such tournaments; requiring specified information to be posted at the premises at which such tournament is conducted; requiring such organization to submit each tournament result to its board of directors; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (6) of section 546.10, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

546.10 Amusement games or machines.—

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- (b) A Type C amusement game or machine may only be operated at:
- 1. A facility as defined in s. 721.05(17) that is under the control of a timeshare plan;
 - 2. An arcade amusement center;
 - 3. A bowling center, as defined in s. 849.141;

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4. The premises of a retailer, as defined in s. 212.02;

- 5. A public lodging establishment or public food service establishment licensed pursuant to chapter 509;
 - 6. A truck stop; or
- 7. The premises of a veterans' service organization granted a federal charter under Title 36, U.S.C., or a division, department, post, or chapter of such organization, for which an alcoholic beverage license has been issued if no profit is received by such organization, or a division, department, post, or chapter thereof, and all proceeds from the amusement game or machine are used strictly for the welfare of local veterans and their families.

Section 2. Section 849.0932, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

849.0932 Poker tournaments by certain organizations authorized; conditions for conduct; permitted uses of proceeds; limitations; required posted notice.—

- (1) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Cards" means a deck of rectangular pieces of cardboard or other material, each of which has an identical pattern on one side and different numbers or letters, including A, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, J, Q, or K, on the other side, which are used to play various games. A standard deck of cards contains 52 cards divided into four suits, including spades, hearts, clubs, and diamonds, and may include two cards with the word "joker" on them.
- (b) "Charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization"

 means a federal tax-exempt organization under s. 501(c)(3) of

 the Internal Revenue Code which has been actively engaged in

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charitable, civic, community, benevolent, religious, or scholastic works or other similar activities for at least 3 years.

- (c) "Chips" means small disk-shaped counters used to represent money when betting during gambling. Each chip has a number on it to represent a different monetary amount but has no monetary value.
- (d) "Hand" means the cards dealt during one round of play of a game of poker.
- (e) "Poker" means one or more of the common gambling card games.
- (f) "Poker tournament" means the playing of poker in a tournament format, in which:
- 1. A participant pays an entry fee to compete for a cash prize and receives chips and a seat at a table.
- 2. Cards are dealt to each participant to commence the game, and he or she has the opportunity to bet on each hand using chips and without exchanging any money during the game.
- 3. The dealer awards the pot to the winner or winners of the hand at the conclusion of each hand.
- 4. A participant wins and loses chips as the tournament progresses and is eliminated from the tournament when he or she loses all of his or her chips.
- 5. Play continues until a winner or winners are determined as defined by the specific tournament rules.
- (g) "Pot" means the total amount of chips that are bet for one hand.
 - (h) "Seat" means a participant's position at a table.
 - (2) (a) This chapter does not prohibit or prevent a

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charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization from conducting a poker tournament if all of the proceeds derived from such tournament, less actual business expenses essential for the operation, conduct, and playing of such tournament, are donated by such organization to the works or activities described in paragraph (1) (b) and not used for any other purpose. The proceeds derived from such tournament may not be considered solicitation of public donations.

- (b) A charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization may not sponsor a poker tournament conducted by an organization that is not federal tax-exempt.
- (3) (a) The total entry fee per participant for a poker tournament may not exceed \$200.
- (b) The cash prize distributed to participants is awarded as determined by the specific tournament rules and must amount to at least 40 percent but not more than 80 percent of the sum of all entry fees.
- (c) The charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization must retain at least 20 percent of the sum of all entry fees before the cash prize is distributed.
- (4) (a) A person involved in conducting a poker tournament pursuant to this section must be a resident of the community in which the charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization is located, must be a bona fide member of such organization, and may not be compensated in any way for being involved in conducting such tournament.
- (b) A charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization must designate at least one but not more than three of its members to manage the poker tournament, at least one of whom shall be

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present during the entire tournament.

- (5) (a) A charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization conducting a poker tournament must be located in, or within a 15-mile radius of, the county in which the poker tournament is conducted.
- (b) The equipment used in the poker tournament must be owned by the charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization conducting the tournament.
- (6) (a) No person under 18 years of age may participate in, or be involved in any way in, a poker tournament.
- (b) A charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization conducting a poker tournament that is open to the public may refuse entry to a person if it determines that such person is objectionable or undesirable, but such refusal may not be on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, pregnancy, national origin, age, handicap, or marital status.
- (7) A charitable, nonprofit, or veterans' organization conducting a poker tournament must post the following notices in a conspicuous location on the premises at which the tournament is conducted:
- (a) The name of the organization and the designated member or members managing the tournament.
 - (b) The rules and regulations of the poker tournament.
- (c) The minimum and maximum entry fees and an itemization of the distribution of such fees, including the amount retained by the charity and the amounts used for tournament expenses such as cash prizes and food.
- (d) The results of the most recent tournament including the sum of entry fees and the distribution of cash prizes.

150	Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2017.
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
