15	(c) "Industrial hemp" means all parts and varieties of the
16	cannabis sativa plant, cultivated or possessed by an approved
17	grower under the pilot project, whether growing or not, which
18	contain a tetrahydrocannabinol concentration that does not
19	exceed 0.3 percent on a dry-weight basis.
20	(d) "Industrial hemp pilot project" or "pilot project"
21	means a project that includes research of industrial hemp and
22	any aspect of cultivation, harvesting, processing, market
23	research, and sales of approved industrial hemp agricultural,
24	industrial, and commercial products.
25	(e) "Qualified program personnel" means a person who, or
26	an employee of a company that, partners with a university on a
27	pilot project, is certified by the university, and is 18 years
28	of age or older.
29	(f) "Qualified project partner" means a public, nonprofit,
30	or private entity that:
31	1. Has a principal place of business is in this state.
32	2. Has access to a grow site and research facility located
33	in this state which is acceptable for the cultivation,
34	processing, and manufacturing of industrial hemp and hemp
35	products, as determined by the department.
36	3. Submits a comprehensive business or research plan
37	acceptable to the partnering university.
38	4. Provides proof of prior experience in or knowledge of,

66	7. Compliance with state and federal law.
67	(c) The department shall initiate rulemaking pursuant to
68	this subsection within 4 months after the effective date of this
69	act.
70	(3) A university must obtain the authorization of its
71	board of trustees before implementing an industrial hemp pilot
72	project. A pilot project authorized by a university must be
73	registered with the department and must comply with rules
74	adopted by the department.
75	(4) A university that implements an industrial hemp pilot
76	project shall develop partnerships with qualified project
77	partners to attract experts and investors experienced with
78	agriculture and may develop the pilot project in partnership
79	with public, nonprofit, and private entities in accordance with
80	this section and all applicable state and federal laws.
81	(5) The research office of a university that implements an
82	industrial hemp pilot project shall oversee the pilot project
83	and ensure compliance with rules adopted by the department. The
84	office must identify a contact person who is responsible for
85	oversight of the pilot project and shall adopt procedures and
86	guidelines to ensure the proper operation of the pilot project,
87	the proper handling of hemp material and products, compliance
88	with state and federal law, and the safety and security of the
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89	pilot project facility. At a minimum, the guidelines must:
90	(a) Designate the physical location, global positioning
91	system position, and map of the pilot project facility. Areas
92	within the facility must be designated as general access or
93	limited access. An area where hemp material is cultivated,
94	processed, stored, or packaged or where industrial hemp research
95	is conducted must be designated as limited access. Limited-
96	access areas must be restricted to entry by qualified program
97	personnel and authorized visitors accompanied at all times by
98	qualified program personnel. All other areas of the facility may
99	be designated as general access and are open to authorized
100	visitors, regardless of whether accompanied by qualified program
101	personnel.
102	(b) Identify the qualified program personnel involved in
103	the pilot project who meet the requirements of 21 CFR s. 1301.18
104	pursuant to the Agricultural Act of 2014, 7 U.S.C. s. 5940.
105	(c) Authorize the qualified program personnel to handle,
106	grow, cultivate, process, and manufacture hemp materials.
107	(d) Establish a testing program and protocols to ensure
108	the proper labeling of hemp material.
109	(6) An industrial hemp commercialization project may only
110	be conducted after an industrial hemp pilot project has been in
111	place for 2 years to determine if there are any adverse impacts
112	of hemp cultivation on current indigenous crops in the state.
113	(7) A university that implements an industrial hemp pilot
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114	project shall submit a report to the Governor, the President of
115	the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on
116	the status of its pilot project and any research related to the
117	cultivation, harvesting, processing, and uses of industrial
118	hemp. The report must be prepared and submitted within 2 years
