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26	should be subject to regulation to protect the public from the
27	practice of music therapy by unregistered persons.
28	(2) DEFINITIONSAs used in this section, the term:
29	(a) "Board-certified music therapist" means a person who
30	has completed the education and clinical training requirements
31	established by the American Music Therapy Association and who
32	holds current board certification from the national
33	Certification Board for Music Therapists.
34	(b) "Music therapist" means a person registered to
35	practice music therapy pursuant to this section.
36	(c) "Music therapy" means the clinical and evidence-based
37	use of music interventions by a board-certified music therapist
38	to accomplish individualized goals for people of all ages and
39	ability levels within a therapeutic relationship. The music
40	therapy interventions may include music improvisation, receptive
41	music listening, song writing, lyric discussion, music and
42	imagery, singing, music performance, learning through music,
43	music combined with other arts, music-assisted relaxation,
44	music-based patient education, electronic music technology,
45	adapted music intervention, and movement to music. The practice
46	of music therapy does not include the diagnosis or assessment of
47	any physical, mental, or communication disorder.
48	(3) REGISTRATION
49	(a) The department shall register an applicant as a music
50	therapist when the applicant submits to the department:

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51	1. A completed application on a form issued by the
52	department;
53	2. Application and registration fees; and
54	3. Proof of passing the examination for board
55	certification offered by the national Certification Board for
56	Music Therapists, or any successor organization, or proof of
57	being transitioned into board certification and provides proof
58	that the applicant is currently a board-certified music
59	therapist.
60	(b) A registration issued under this section must be
61	renewed biennially by submitting to the department a renewal fee
62	and proof that the applicant holds an active certificate as a
63	board-certified music therapist.
64	(c) A registrant shall inform the department within 10
65	days after a change of the registrant's address or a change in
66	the registrant's status as a board-certified music therapist.
67	(4) RESPONSIBILITIES OF A MUSIC THERAPISTA music
68	therapist is authorized to:
69	(a) Accept referrals for music therapy services from
70	medical, developmental, mental health, or education
71	professionals; family members; clients; caregivers; or other
72	persons authorized to provide client services.
73	(b) Collaborate with a client's primary care provider to
74	review the client's diagnosis, treatment needs, and treatment
75	plan before providing services to a client with an identified

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76	clinical or developmental need or collaborate with the client's
77	treatment team while providing music therapy services to the
78	<u>client.</u>
79	(c) Conduct a music therapy assessment of a client to
80	determine if treatment is indicated and, if treatment is
81	indicated, collect systematic, comprehensive, and accurate
82	information to determine the appropriateness and type of music
83	therapy services to provide for the client.
84	(d) Develop an individualized music therapy treatment
85	plan, including individualized goals, objectives, and specific
86	music therapy approaches or interventions, for the client that
87	is based on the results of the music therapy assessment and is
88	consistent with any other developmental, rehabilitative,
89	habilitative, medical, mental health, preventive, wellness, or
90	educational services being provided to the client.
91	(e) Evaluate the client's response to music therapy and
92	the music therapy treatment plan, documenting change and
93	progress and suggesting modifications, as appropriate.
94	(f) Develop a plan for determining when music therapy
95	services are no longer needed, in collaboration with the client
96	and the client's physician or other provider of health care or
97	education to the client, family members of the client, and any
98	other appropriate person upon whom the client relies for
99	support.
100	(g) Minimize barriers to ensure that the client receives
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101	music therapy services in the least restrictive environment.
102	(h) Collaborate with and educate the client and the
103	client's family members, caregivers, and any other appropriate
104	persons regarding the needs of the client which are being
105	addressed in music therapy and the manner in which the music
106	therapy treatment addresses those needs.
107	(i) Use appropriate knowledge and skills to inform
108	practice, including the use of research, reasoning, and problem-
109	solving skills to determine appropriate actions in the context
110	of each specific clinical setting.
111	(5) PROHIBITED ACTS; EXEMPTIONSA person may not practice
112	music therapy or represent himself or herself as being able to
113	practice music therapy in this state unless the person is
114	registered pursuant to this section. This section does not
115	prohibit or restrict the practice, services, or activities of
116	the following:
117	(a) A person licensed, certified, or regulated under the
118	laws of this state in another profession or occupation, or
119	personnel supervised by a licensed professional in this state
120	performing work, including the use of music, incidental to the
121	practice of his or her licensed, certified, or regulated
122	profession or occupation, if that person does not represent
123	himself or herself as a music therapist;
124	(b) A person whose training and national certification
125	attests to the person's preparation and ability to practice his
