House Resolution

A resolution congratulating Barry Jenkins and Tarell Alvin McCraney on the success of their film "Moonlight."

WHEREAS, writer and director Barry Jenkins was born and grew up in Liberty City, a neighborhood in Miami, and attended Florida State University where he earned a Bachelor of Arts in English and a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Film from the College of Motion Picture Arts, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Jenkins directed the film "Medicine for Melancholy" as well as multiple short films, was a curator and presenter at the Telluride Film Festival, is a United States Artists Smith Fellow, and was recently named one of the "20 Directors to Watch" in world cinema by the New York Times, and

WHEREAS, playwright and actor Tarell Alvin McCraney was also born and grew up in Liberty City and earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Acting from the Theater School at DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois, a Master of Fine Arts in Playwriting from the Yale School of Drama, and received an honorary doctorate from the University of Warwick in Coventry, England, and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCraney received a MacArthur Fellowship, the Whiting Award, the Steinberg Playwright Award, the Evening Standard Award, the New York Times Outstanding Playwright Award,

the Paula Vogel Playwriting Award, the Windham Campbell Award, and a Doris Duke Artist Award, and

 WHEREAS, Mr. McCraney was the International Writer-in-Residence for the Royal Shakespeare Company from 2008 through 2010, a resident playwright at New Dramatists, and is the incoming chair of playwriting at the Yale School of Drama and a member of the Steppenwolf Theatre Ensemble and the Teo Castellanos D-Projects Theater Company, and

WHEREAS, together, Barry Jenkins and Tarell Alvin McCraney co-wrote the film "Moonlight," which is based on Mr. McCraney's play "In Moonlight Black Boys Look Blue" and was directed by Mr. Jenkins, and

WHEREAS, "Moonlight," which chronicles the childhood, adolescence, and burgeoning adulthood of a young black man growing up in a rough neighborhood in Miami, was filmed in Liberty City, and captures a portion of Miami's rich black history, and

WHEREAS, "Moonlight" celebrates African-American life in Liberty City, one of Miami's poorest neighborhoods which has struggled with poverty, violence, drugs, and unemployment, and brings into focus a story that for so long has been neglected, forgotten, and, in some instances, actively suppressed, and

WHEREAS, "Moonlight" was nominated for eight Academy Awards by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, six Golden Globe Awards by the Hollywood Foreign Press, four BAFTA Awards

by the British Academy of Film and Television Arts, three Screen Actors Guild Awards, and four AAFCA Awards by the African-American Film Critics Association, among many others, and

WHEREAS, the film went on to win Best Picture, Best Adapted Screenplay, and Best Performance by an Actor in a Supporting Role at the 89th Academy Awards; Best Motion Picture at the Golden Globes; Outstanding Performance by a Male Actor in a Supporting Role at the Screen Actors Guild Awards; and Best Picture, Best Director, Best Supporting Actor, and Best Independent Film by the African-American Film Critics Association to name only a few of over 100 awards earned by the film, and

WHEREAS, with a production cost of \$1.5 million, "Moonlight" originally made \$27.8 million in domestic movie ticket sales, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, "Almost always, the creative, dedicated minority has made the world better," and Barry Jenkins and Tarell Alvin McCraney are two such examples, promoting a reality that has defiantly maintained a cultural richness and sense of community, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That Barry Jenkins and Tarell Alvin McCraney are congratulated on the success of their film "Moonlight" and thanked for their contributions to their community and the State of Florida
