73	1. Must be designated for student use;
74	2. May contain or be accompanied by teaching guides and
75	study helps; and
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76 <u>3. Must include all textbooks, workbooks, and student</u>
77 <u>materials and supplements necessary for a student to fully</u>
78 participate in coursework.

79 (2) (1) DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD. - The district school board 80 has the constitutional duty and responsibility to select and 81 provide adequate instructional materials for all students in 82 accordance with the requirements of this part. The term "adequate instructional materials" means a sufficient number of 83 student or site licenses or sets of materials that are available 84 85 in bound, unbound, kit, or package form and may consist of 86 hardbacked or softbacked textbooks, electronic content, 87 consumables, learning laboratories, manipulatives, electronic 88 media, and computer courseware or software that serve as the 89 basis for instruction for each student in the core subject areas of mathematics, language arts, social studies, science, reading, 90 and literature. The district school board also has the following 91 92 specific duties and responsibilities:

93 (a) Courses of study; adoption.-Adopt courses of study,
94 including instructional materials, for use in the schools of the
95 district.

96 1. Each district school board is responsible for the
97 content of all instructional materials used in a classroom,
98 whether adopted and purchased, leased, licensed, or acquired
99 from the state-adopted instructional materials list <u>or</u>, adopted
100 and purchased, leased, licensed, or acquired for use by the

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101 district through a district instructional materials program 102 under s. 1006.283, or otherwise purchased or made available in 103 the classroom. Regardless of whether the instructional materials used by a district are purchased, leased, licensed, or acquired 104 105 from the state-adopted instructional materials list or 106 purchased, leased, licensed, or acquired for use by the district 107 through a district instructional materials program under s. 108 1006.283, each district school board shall ensure that all 109 instructional materials used in the classroom meet the following 110 criteria: a. Be research-based and proven to be effective in 111 112 supporting student learning; 113 b. Provide a noninflammatory, objective, and balanced 114 viewpoint on issues; 115 c. Be appropriate to the students' ages and varying levels 116 of learning; 117 d. Be accurate and factual; 118 e. Be of acceptable technical quality; and 119 f. Be free of pornography or content otherwise prohibited pursuant to s. 847.012(3). 120 121 122 A district may not determine that instructional materials used 123 in the classroom meet the criteria specified in this 124 subparagraph on the basis that such materials were purchased, 125 leased, licensed, or acquired from the state-adopted

129	2. Each district school board <u>shall</u> <del>must</del> adopt a policy

133	instructional material <u>based on the criteria specified in</u>

Within 30 days after the 30-day period 161 162 has expired, the school board shall must conduct at least one open public hearing on all petitions timely received and provide 163 164 the petitioner written notification of the date and time of the 165 hearing at least 7 days before the hearing. The school board 166 shall make all contested instructional materials contested must 167 be made accessible online to the public at least 7 days before a 168 public hearing. The school board's decision after convening a 169 hearing is final and not subject to further petition or review. 170 Instructional materials.-Provide for proper (b) 171 requisitioning, distribution, accounting, storage, care, and use 172 of all instructional materials and furnish such other instructional materials as may be needed. Instructional 173 174 materials used must be consistent with the district goals and 175 objectives and the course descriptions established in rule of

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176 the State Board of Education, as well as with the applicable 177 Next Generation Sunshine State Standards provided for in s. 178 1003.41, with standards that are equivalent to or better than 179 the applicable state standards, or with courses offered in the 180 district pursuant to s. 1003.4282(1).

(c) Other instructional materials.-Provide such other
teaching accessories and aids as are needed for the school
district's educational program.

184 School library media services; establishment and (d) 185 maintenance.-Establish and maintain a program of school library media services for all public schools in the district, including 186 187 school library media centers, or school library media centers open to the public, and, in addition such traveling or 188 189 circulating libraries as may be needed for the proper operation 190 of the district school system. Parents and other persons who pay 191 ad valorem property taxes or sales taxes in the state shall be 192 given full access to materials in school libraries.

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(3) (2) DISTRICT SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT.-

(a) The district school superintendent has the duty to
recommend such plans for improving, providing, distributing,
accounting for, and caring for instructional materials and other
instructional aids as will result in general improvement of the
district school system, as prescribed in this part, in
accordance with adopted district school board rules prescribing
the duties and responsibilities of the district school

physical, and racial diversity of our society, including men and
women in professional, career, and executive roles, and the role
and contributions of the entrepreneur and labor in the total
development of this state and the United States.

(b) Include only materials that accurately portray, whenever appropriate, humankind's place in ecological systems, including the necessity for the protection of our environment and conservation of our natural resources and the effects on the human system of the use of tobacco, alcohol, controlled substances, and other dangerous substances.

365 (c) Include materials that encourage thrift, fire366 prevention, and humane treatment of people and animals.

367 Require, when appropriate to the comprehension of (d) 368 students, that materials for social science, history, or civics 369 classes contain the Declaration of Independence and the 370 Constitution of the United States. A reviewer may not recommend 371 any instructional materials that contain any matter reflecting 372 unfairly upon persons because of their race, color, creed, national origin, ancestry, gender, religion, disability, 373 374 socioeconomic status, or occupation.

467 1006.42 Responsibility of students and parents for 468 instructional materials.-All instructional materials purchased, 469 leased, licensed, acquired, or used by the district under the 470 provisions of this part are the property of the district school 471 board. When distributed to the students, these instructional 472 materials are on loan to the students while they are pursuing their courses of study and are to be returned at the direction 473 474 of the school principal or the teacher in charge. Each parent of 475 a student to whom or for whom instructional materials have been

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476 issued, is liable for any loss or destruction of, or unnecessary 477 damage to, the instructional materials or for failure of the 478 student to return the instructional materials when directed by 479 the school principal or the teacher in charge, and shall pay for 480 such loss, destruction, or unnecessary damage as provided under 481 <u>s. 1006.28(4)</u> <del>s. 1006.28(3)</del>.
