Paragraph (h) of subsection (2), subsection 19 (3), and paragraph (d) of subsection (8) of section 121.0515, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 20 21 121.0515 Special Risk Class.-22 (2) MEMBERSHIP.-Effective August 1, 2008, "special risk member" 23 (h) includes any member who meets the special criteria for continued 24 25 membership set forth in paragraph (3)(k) $\frac{(3)(j)}{(3)(j)}$. 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26 (3) CRITERIA.—A member, to be designated as a special risk27 member, must meet the following criteria:

28 Effective October 1, 1978, the member must be employed (a) 29 as a law enforcement officer and be certified, or required to be 30 certified, in compliance with s. 943.1395, except that; however, 31 sheriffs and elected police chiefs are not required to be 32 certified excluded from meeting the certification requirements 33 of this paragraph. In addition, the member's duties and 34 responsibilities must include the pursuit, apprehension, and 35 arrest of law violators or suspected law violators; or as of July 1, 1982, the member must be an active member of a bomb 36 37 disposal unit whose primary responsibility is the location, 38 handling, and disposal of explosive devices; or the member must 39 be the supervisor or command officer of a member or members who have such responsibilities. Administrative support personnel, 40 including, but not limited to, those whose primary duties and 41 42 responsibilities are in accounting, purchasing, legal, and 43 personnel, are not included;

(b) Effective October 1, 1978, the member must be employed as a firefighter and be certified, or required to be certified, in compliance with s. 633.408 and be employed solely within the fire department of a local government employer or an agency of state government with firefighting responsibilities. In addition, the member's duties and responsibilities must include on-the-scene fighting of fires; as of October 1, 2001, fire

prevention or firefighter training; as of October 1, 2001, 51 52 direct supervision of firefighting units, fire prevention, or 53 firefighter training; or as of July 1, 2001, aerial firefighting 54 surveillance performed by fixed-wing aircraft pilots employed by 55 the Florida Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture and 56 Consumer Services; or the member must be the supervisor or 57 command officer of a member or members who have such 58 responsibilities. Administrative support personnel, including, 59 but not limited to, those whose primary duties and 60 responsibilities are in accounting, purchasing, legal, and personnel, are not included. All periods of creditable service 61 62 in fire prevention or firefighter training, or as the supervisor or command officer of a member or members who have such 63 64 responsibilities, and for which the employer paid the special risk contribution rate, are included; 65

Effective October 1, 1978, the member must be employed 66 (C) 67 as a correctional officer and be certified, or required to be certified, in compliance with s. 943.1395. In addition, the 68 69 member's primary duties and responsibilities must include be the 70 custody, and physical restraint if when necessary, of prisoners 71 or inmates within a prison, jail, or other criminal detention 72 facility, or while on work detail outside the facility, or while being transported; or as of July 1, 1984, the member must be the 73 74 supervisor or command officer of a member or members who have 75 such responsibilities. Administrative support personnel,

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including, but not limited to, those whose primary duties and responsibilities are in accounting, purchasing, legal, and personnel, are not included; however, wardens and assistant wardens, as defined by rule, are included;

80 (d) Effective October 1, 1999, the member must be employed 81 by a licensed Advance Life Support (ALS) or Basic Life Support 82 (BLS) employer as an emergency medical technician or a paramedic 83 and be certified in compliance with s. 401.27. In addition, the member's primary duties and responsibilities must include on-84 the-scene emergency medical care or as of October 1, 2001, 85 direct supervision of emergency medical technicians or 86 87 paramedics, or the member must be the supervisor or command 88 officer of one or more members who have such responsibility. 89 Administrative support personnel, including, but not limited to, 90 those whose primary responsibilities are in accounting, purchasing, legal, and personnel, are not included; 91

92 (e) Effective January 1, 2001, the member must be employed 93 as a community-based correctional probation officer and be 94 certified, or required to be certified, in compliance with s. 95 943.1395. In addition, the member's primary duties and 96 responsibilities must be the supervised custody, surveillance, control, investigation, and counseling of assigned inmates, 97 probationers, parolees, or community controllees within the 98 community; or the member must be the supervisor of a member or 99 100 members who have such responsibilities. Administrative support

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personnel, including, but not limited to, those whose primary 101 102 duties and responsibilities are in accounting, purchasing, legal 103 services, and personnel management, are not included; however, 104 probation and parole circuit and deputy circuit administrators 105 are included; Effective January 1, 2001, the member must be employed 106 (f) 107 in one of the following classes and must spend at least 75 108 percent of his or her time performing duties that which involve 109 contact with patients or inmates in a correctional or forensic 110 facility or institution: Dietitian (class codes 5203 and 5204); 111 1. 112 2. Public health nutrition consultant (class code 5224); Psychological specialist (class codes 5230 and 5231); 113 3. 114 4. Pharmacy manager (class code 5251); Effective October 1, 2005, through June 30, 2008, the 143 (q) member must be employed by a law enforcement agency or medical 144 examiner's office in a forensic discipline recognized by the 145 146 International Association for Identification and must qualify 147 for active membership in the International Association for Identification. The member's primary duties and responsibilities 148 must include the collection, examination, preservation, 149 documentation, preparation, or analysis of physical evidence or 150

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151 testimony, or both, or the member must be the direct supervisor, 152 quality management supervisor, or command officer of one or more 153 individuals with such responsibility. Administrative support 154 personnel, including, but not limited to, those whose primary 155 responsibilities are clerical or in accounting, purchasing, 156 legal, and personnel, are not included;

(h) Effective July 1, 2008, the member must be employed by the Department of Law Enforcement in the crime laboratory or by the Division of State Fire Marshal in the forensic laboratory in one of the following classes:

Forensic technologist (class code 8459); 161 1. 162 2. Crime laboratory technician (class code 8461); Crime laboratory analyst (class code 8463); 163 3. 164 4. Senior crime laboratory analyst (class code 8464); 165 Crime laboratory analyst supervisor (class code 8466); 5. Forensic chief (class code 9602); or 166 6. 167 7. Forensic services quality manager (class code 9603); Effective July 1, 2008, the member must be employed by 168 (i) 169 a local government law enforcement agency or medical examiner's 170 office and must spend at least 65 percent of his or her time 171 performing duties that involve the collection, examination, preservation, documentation, preparation, or analysis of human 172 tissues or fluids or physical evidence having potential 173 174 biological, chemical, or radiological hazard or contamination, or use chemicals, processes, or materials that may have 175

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carcinogenic or health-damaging properties in the analysis of 176 177 such evidence, or the member must be the direct supervisor of 178 one or more individuals having such responsibility. If a special 179 risk member changes to another position within the same agency, 180 he or she must submit a complete application as provided in 181 paragraph (4)(a); or 182 (j) Effective July 1, 2019, the member must be employed as 183 a 911 public safety telecommunicator as defined in s. 401.465. 184 However, 185 1. Upon his or her retirement, the member shall have his or her benefits calculated in accordance with the Regular Class 186 187 benefit provisions of s. 121.091(1)(a)1.; or 188 2. For all 911 telecommunicators certified on or before 189 December 31, 2011, the number of creditable years for full 190 retirement eligibility shall be 25 years without penalty; or 191 (k) (i) The member must have already qualified for and be 192 actively participating in special risk membership under 193 paragraph (a), paragraph (b), or paragraph (c), must have 194 suffered a qualifying injury as defined in this paragraph, must 195 not be receiving disability retirement benefits as provided in s. 121.091(4), and must satisfy the requirements of this 196 197 paragraph. The ability to qualify for the class of membership 198 1. defined in paragraph (2) (h) occurs when two licensed medical 199 200 physicians, one of whom is a primary treating physician of the

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201 member, certify the existence of the physical injury and medical 202 condition that constitute a qualifying injury as defined in this 203 paragraph and that the member has reached maximum medical 204 improvement after August 1, 2008. The certifications from the 205 licensed medical physicians must include, at a minimum, that the 206 injury to the special risk member has resulted in a physical 207 loss, or loss of use, of at least two of the following: left 208 arm, right arm, left leg, or right leg; and that:

a. <u>The That this physical loss or loss of use is total and</u> permanent, <u>unless</u> except if the loss of use is due to a physical injury to the member's brain, in which event the loss of use is permanent with at least 75 percent loss of motor function with respect to each arm or leg affected.

214 b. <u>The That this physical loss or loss of use renders the</u> 215 member physically unable to perform the essential job functions 216 of his or her special risk position.

c. That, Notwithstanding this physical loss or loss of use, the individual can perform the essential job functions required by the member's new position, as provided in subparagraph 3.

d. That Use of artificial limbs is not possible or does
not alter the member's ability to perform the essential job
functions of the member's position.

e. That The physical loss or loss of use is a direct result of a physical injury and not a result of any mental,

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226 psychological, or emotional injury.

227 For the purposes of this paragraph, the term 2. 228 "qualifying injury" means an injury sustained in the line of 229 duty, as certified by the member's employing agency, by a 230 special risk member that does not result in total and permanent 231 disability as defined in s. 121.091(4)(b). An injury is a 232 qualifying injury if the injury is a physical injury to the 233 member's physical body resulting in a physical loss, or loss of use, of at least two of the following: left arm, right arm, left 234 leq, or right leq. Notwithstanding any other provision of this 235 section, an injury that would otherwise qualify as a qualifying 236 237 injury is not considered a qualifying injury if and when the 238 member ceases employment with the employer for whom he or she 239 was providing special risk services on the date the injury 240 occurred.

241 3. The new position, as described in sub-subparagraph 242 1.c., which that is required for qualification as a special risk 243 member under this paragraph is not required to be a position 244 with essential job functions that entitle an individual to 245 special risk membership. Whether a new position as described in 246 sub-subparagraph 1.c. exists and is available to the special 247 risk member is a decision to be made solely by the employer in accordance with its hiring practices and applicable law. 248

249 4. This paragraph does not grant or create additional250 rights for any individual to continued employment or to be hired

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251 or rehired by his or her employer which that are not already 252 provided by state law within the Florida Statutes, the State 253 Constitution, the Americans with Disabilities Act, if 254 applicable, or any other applicable state or federal law. 255 (8) SPECIAL RISK ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT CLASS.-256 Notwithstanding any other provision of this (d) 257 subsection, this subsection does not apply to any special risk 258 member who qualifies for continued membership pursuant to 259 paragraph (3) (k) $\frac{(3)(j)}{(3)(j)}$. Section 2. Subsection (1) of section 121.091, Florida 260 261 Statutes, is amended to read: 262 121.091 Benefits payable under the system.-Benefits may 263 not be paid under this section unless the member has terminated 264 employment as provided in s. 121.021(39)(a) or begun 265 participation in the Deferred Retirement Option Program as 266 provided in subsection (13), and a proper application has been 267 filed in the manner prescribed by the department. The department 268 may cancel an application for retirement benefits when the 269 member or beneficiary fails to timely provide the information 270 and documents required by this chapter and the department's 271 rules. The department shall adopt rules establishing procedures 272 for application for retirement benefits and for the cancellation of such application when the required information or documents 273 274 are not received.

(1) NORMAL RETIREMENT BENEFIT.-Upon attaining his or her

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276 normal retirement date, the member, upon application to the administrator, shall receive a monthly benefit which shall begin 277 278 to accrue on the first day of the month of retirement and be 279 payable on the last day of that month and each month thereafter 280 during his or her lifetime. The normal retirement benefit, 281 including any past or additional retirement credit, may not 282 exceed 100 percent of the average final compensation. The amount 283 of monthly benefit shall be calculated as the product of A and B, subject to the adjustment of C, if applicable, as set forth 284 285 below:

(a)1. For creditable years of Regular Class service, A is 286 287 1.60 percent of the member's average final compensation, up to 288 the member's normal retirement date. Upon completion of the 289 first year after the normal retirement date, A is 1.63 percent 290 of the member's average final compensation. Following the second 291 year after the normal retirement date, A is 1.65 percent of the 292 member's average final compensation. Following the third year 293 after the normal retirement date, and for subsequent years, A is 294 1.68 percent of the member's average final compensation. 295 Notwithstanding subparagraph 2., for creditable years of special 296 risk service through employment as a 911 public safety 297 telecommunicator as provided in s. 121.0515(3)(j), the amount of 298 monthly benefit shall be calculated in accordance with this 299 subparagraph. 300 For creditable years of special risk service, A is: 2.

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301 Two percent of the member's average final compensation a. for all creditable years before prior to October 1, 1974; 302 303 b. Three percent of the member's average final 304 compensation for all creditable years after September 30, 1974, 305 and before October 1, 1978; 306 Two percent of the member's average final compensation с. 307 for all creditable years after September 30, 1978, and before 308 January 1, 1989; 309 d. Two and two-tenths percent of the member's final 310 monthly compensation for all creditable years after December 31, 311 1988, and before January 1, 1990; 312 Two and four-tenths percent of the member's average e. final compensation for all creditable years after December 31, 313 314 1989, and before January 1, 1991; 315 Two and six-tenths percent of the member's average f. final compensation for all creditable years after December 31, 316 317 1990, and before January 1, 1992; Two and eight-tenths percent of the member's average 318 q. 319 final compensation for all creditable years after December 31, 320 1991, and before January 1, 1993; 321 Three percent of the member's average final h. 322 compensation for all creditable years after December 31, 1992; 323 and 324 Three percent of the member's average final i. 325 compensation for all creditable years of service after September

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326 30, 1978, and before January 1, 1993, for any special risk 327 member who retires after July 1, 2000, or any member of the 328 Special Risk Administrative Support Class entitled to retain the 329 special risk normal retirement date who was a member of the 330 Special Risk Class during the time period and who retires after 331 July 1, 2000.

332 3. For creditable years of Senior Management Service Class
333 service after January 31, 1987, A is 2 percent;

334 4. For creditable years of Elected Officers' Class service 335 as a Supreme Court Justice, district court of appeal judge, 336 circuit judge, or county court judge, A is 3 1/3 percent of the 337 member's average final compensation, and for all other 338 creditable service in such class, A is 3 percent of average 339 final compensation;

340 (b) B is the number of the member's years and any
341 fractional part of a year of creditable service earned
342 subsequent to November 30, 1970; and

343 (c) C is the normal retirement benefit credit brought 344 forward as of November 30, 1970, by a former member of an 345 existing system. Such normal retirement benefit credit shall be 346 determined as the product of X and Y when X is the percentage of 347 average final compensation which the member would have been eligible to receive if the member had attained his or her normal 348 retirement date as of November 30, 1970, all in accordance with 349 350 the existing system under which the member is covered on

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351	November 30, 1970, and Y is average final compensation as
352	defined in s. 121.021(24). However, any member of an existing
353	retirement system who is eligible to retire and who does retire,
354	become disabled, or die prior to April 15, 1971, may have his or
355	her retirement benefits calculated on the basis of the best 5 of
356	the last 10 years of service.
357	(d) A member's average final compensation shall be
358	determined by formula to obtain the coverage for the 5 highest
359	fiscal years' salaries, calculated as provided by rule.

400	Section 4. The Legislature finds that a proper and
401	legitimate state purpose is served when employees and retirees
402	of the state and its political subdivisions, and the dependents,
403	survivors, and beneficiaries of such employees and retirees, are
404	extended the basic protections afforded by governmental
405	retirement systems. These persons must be provided benefits that
406	are fair and adequate and are managed, administered, and funded
407	in an actuarially sound manner, as required by s. 14, Article X
408	of the State Constitution and part VII of chapter 112, Florida
409	Statutes. Therefore, the Legislature determines and declares
410	that this act fulfills an important state interest.
411	Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2019.

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
