17	penalties for violations of the moratorium by a local
18	government entity; providing an effective date.

20	WHEREAS, single-use plastic straws comprise less than 1
21	percent of waste and litter, and
22	WHEREAS, alternatives to single-use plastic straws may have
23	equivalent environmental drawbacks or have reduced utility in
24	certain beverage types, and
25	WHEREAS, reducing the availability of single-use plastic
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26	straws may negatively impact persons with disabilities who
27	require single-use plastic straws for feeding and hydration, and
28	WHEREAS, businesses should be free to decide the best
29	manner in which to serve their customers, free from unnecessary
30	governmental intrusion or regulation, and
31	WHEREAS, the prudent deliberation regarding materials usage
32	and the development of policy based on sound research and
33	science will result in better long-term solutions for the state,
34	NOW, THEREFORE,

36	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

38	Section 1. Section 403.7034, Florida Statutes, is created
39	to read:
40	403.7034 Local regulation of single-use plastic straws;
41	moratorium; environmental impact study; penalties
42	(1) Before July 1, 2024, a county, a municipality, or
43	another entity of local government may not adopt or enforce an
44	ordinance or other local regulation relating to single-use
45	plastic straws.
46	(2) In the interim, the department, or an entity
47	designated by the department, shall conduct a study to evaluate
48	the environmental impact of single-use plastic straws. A
49	designated entity must be competent, knowledgeable, and unbiased
50	regarding environmental impact studies.

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51	(3) The environmental impact study must focus on
52	scientific data regarding the environmental impact of single-use
53	plastic straws and the potential impact on the environment of
54	the state of a reduction in the number of, or a prohibition on
55	the use of, single-use plastic straws. The study may consider
56	single-use plastic straw regulations adopted in other
57	jurisdictions in the United States and the actual effectiveness
58	of such regulations in those jurisdictions in terms of
59	environmental impact. The study must also consider the
60	usefulness and environmental impact of potential alternatives to
61	single-use plastic straws and the potential impact of reducing
62	or eliminating single-use plastic straws on the quality of life
63	of persons with disabilities who may rely on single-use plastic
64	straws for feeding and hydration.
65	(4) The department shall report the results of the
66	environmental impact study to the Legislature by January 1,
67	2024. If, upon evaluating the results of the study, the
68	Legislature does not enact a general law specifying a statewide
69	policy regarding single-use plastic straws or a law preempting
70	local regulation of single-use plastic straws, the moratorium on
71	local regulation and enforcement under this section is lifted,
72	effective July 1, 2024.
73	(5) An attempt by a county, a municipality, or another
74	entity of local government to adopt or enforce single-use
75	
, 0	plastic straw regulations before July 1, 2024, is a violation of

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76	this chapter and shall result in a fine to the offending local
77	governmental entity in the amount of \$25,000. Further, the
78	offending local governmental entity is responsible for the
79	attorney fees and costs of any party filing and prevailing in a
80	civil action to enforce the terms of the moratorium.
81	Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2019.

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
