2 An act relating to dental services; providing 3 legislative intent; creating s. 381.4019, F.S.; 4 establishing the Dental Student Loan Repayment Program 5 to support dentists who practice in public health 6 programs located in certain underserved areas; 7 providing definitions; requiring the Department of 8 Health to establish a dental student loan repayment 9 program for specified purposes; providing for the 10 award of funds; providing the maximum number of years 11 funds may be awarded; providing eligibility 12 requirements; requiring the department to adopt rules; specifying that implementation of the program is 13 14 subject to legislative appropriation; creating s. 381.40195, F.S.; providing a short title; providing 15 16 definitions; requiring the Department of Health to establish the Donated Dental Services Program to 17 18 provide comprehensive dental care to certain eligible 19 individuals; requiring the department to contract with 20 a nonprofit organization to implement and administer the program; specifying minimum contractual 21 2.2 responsibilities; requiring the department to adopt 23 rules; specifying that implementation of the program is subject to legislative appropriation; providing an 24 25 effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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29	Section 1. It is the intent of the Legislature to promote
30	programs and initiatives that help make available preventive and
31	educational dental services for the citizens of the state, as
32	well as provide quality dental treatment services. The
33	geographic characteristics among the citizens of the state are
34	distinctive and vary from region to region, with such citizens
35	having unique needs regarding access to dental care. The
36	Legislature recognizes that maintaining good oral health is
37	integral to the overall health status of individuals and that
38	the good health of the residents of this state is an important
39	contributing factor in economic development. Better health,
40	including better oral health, increases workplace productivity,
41	reduces the burden of health care costs, and improves the
42	cognitive development of children, resulting in a reduction of
43	missed school days.
44	Section 2. Section 381.4019, Florida Statutes, is created
45	to read:
46	381.4019 Dental Student Loan Repayment ProgramThe
47	Legislature shall establish the Dental Student Loan Repayment
48	Program to promote access to dental care by supporting qualified
49	dentists who treat medically underserved populations in dental
50	health professional shortage areas or medically underserved
51	areas.
52	(1) As used in this section, the term:
53	(a) "Dental health professional shortage area" means a
54	geographic area designated as such by the Health Resources and
55	Services Administration of the United States Department of
56	Health and Human Services.

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57	(b) "Department" means the Department of Health.
58	(c) "Loan program" means the Dental Student Loan Repayment
59	Program.
60	(d) "Medically underserved area" means a geographic area,
61	an area having a special population, or a facility which is
62	designated by department rule as a health professional shortage
63	area as defined by federal regulation and which has a shortage
64	of dental health professionals who serve Medicaid recipients and
65	other low-income patients.
66	(e) "Public health program" means a county health
67	department, the Children's Medical Services program, a federally
68	funded community health center, a federally funded migrant
69	health center, or other publicly funded or nonprofit health care
70	program designated by the department.
71	(2) The department shall establish a dental student loan
72	repayment program to benefit Florida-licensed dentists who
73	demonstrate, as required by department rule, active employment
74	in a public health program that serves Medicaid recipients and
75	other low-income patients and is located in a dental health
76	professional shortage area or a medically underserved area.
77	(3) The department shall award funds from the loan program
78	to repay the student loans of a dentist who meets the
79	requirements of subsection (2).
80	(a) An award may not exceed \$50,000 per year per eligible
81	dentist.
82	(b) Only loans to pay the costs of tuition, books, dental
83	equipment and supplies, uniforms, and living expenses may be
84	covered.
85	(c) All repayments shall be contingent upon continued proof

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86	of eligibility and shall be made directly to the holder of the
87	loan. The state shall bear no responsibility for the collection
88	of any interest charges or other remaining balances.
89	(d) A dentist is eligible to receive funds under the loan
90	program for at least 1 year, up to a maximum of 5 years.
91	(e) The department shall limit the number of new dentists
92	participating in the loan program to not more than 10 per fiscal
93	year.
94	(4) A dentist is no longer eligible to receive funds under
95	the loan program if the dentist:
96	(a) Is no longer employed by a public health program that
97	meets the requirements of subsection (2).
98	(b) Ceases to participate in the Florida Medicaid program.
99	(c) Has disciplinary action taken against his or her
100	license by the Board of Dentistry for a violation of s. 466.028.
101	(5) The department shall adopt rules to administer the loan
102	program.
103	(6) Implementation of the loan program is subject to
104	legislative appropriation.
105	Section 3. Section 381.40195, Florida Statutes, is created
106	to read:
107	381.40195 Donated Dental Services Program
108	(1) This act may be cited as the "Donated Dental Services
109	Act."
110	(2) As used in this section, the term:
111	(a) "Department" means the Department of Health.
112	(b) "Program" means the Donated Dental Services Program as
113	established pursuant to subsection (3).
114	(3) The department shall establish the Donated Dental
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115	Services Program for the purpose of providing comprehensive
116	dental care through a network of volunteer dentists and other
117	dental providers to needy, disabled, elderly, and medically
118	compromised individuals who cannot afford necessary treatment
119	but are ineligible for public assistance. An eligible individual
120	may receive treatment in a volunteer dentist's or participating
121	dental provider's private office or at any other suitable
122	location. An eligible individual is not required to pay any fee
123	or cost associated with the treatment he or she receives.
124	(4) The department shall implement and administer the
125	program. The department shall contract with a nonprofit
126	organization that has experience in providing similar services
127	or administering similar programs. The contract must specify the
128	responsibilities of the nonprofit organization, which may
129	include, but are not limited to:
130	(a) Maintaining a network of volunteer dentists and other
131	dental providers, including, but not limited to, dental
132	specialists and dental laboratories, to provide comprehensive
133	dental services to eligible individuals.
134	(b) Maintaining a system to refer eligible individuals to
135	the appropriate volunteer dentist or participating dental
136	provider.
137	(c) Developing a public awareness and marketing campaign to
138	promote the program and educate eligible individuals about its
139	availability and services.
140	(d) Providing the necessary administrative and technical
141	support to administer the program.
142	(e) Submitting an annual report to the department which
143	must include, at a minimum:

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144	1. Financial data relating to administering the program.
145	2. Demographic data and other information relating to the
146	eligible individuals who are referred to and receive treatment
147	through the program.
148	3. Demographic data and other information relating to the
149	volunteer dentists and participating dental providers who
150	provide dental services through the program.
151	4. Any other data or information that the department may
152	require.
153	(f) Performing any other program-related duties and
154	responsibilities as required by the department.
155	(5) The department shall adopt rules to administer the
156	program.
157	(6) Implementation of the program is subject to legislative
158	appropriation.
159	Section 4. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
