An act relating to water pollution operation permits; amending s. 369.20, F.S.; providing a condition for the exemption from the requirement to obtain a water pollution permit for the application of herbicides to state waters; defining the term "herbicide"; amending s. 403.088, F.S.; revising the requirements for water pollution operation permits; defining the term "multimodal biological control"; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (9) of section 369.20, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

369.20 Florida Aquatic Weed Control Act.-

The application of herbicides to waters of the state for the control of aquatic plants, algae, or invasive exotic plants is exempt from the requirement to obtain a water pollution operation permit pursuant to except as provided in ss. 403.088 and 403.0885 only if multimodal biological control as defined in s. 403.088(2)(c) is implemented in the water body. As used in this subsection, the term "herbicide" means a chemical substance used to control or manipulate undesirable vegetation.

26 403.088, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 403.088 Water pollution operation permits; conditions. (2)

> A permit shall: (C)

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- Specify the manner, nature, volume, and frequency of the discharge permitted;
- Require proper operation and maintenance of any pollution abatement facility by qualified personnel in accordance with standards established by the department;
- 3. Contain such additional conditions, requirements, and restrictions as the department deems necessary to preserve and protect the quality of the receiving waters;
 - Be valid for the period of time specified therein; and
- Constitute the state National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit when issued pursuant to the authority in s. 403.0885; and
- 6. Require substantial evidence, as determined by the department, that multimodal biological control cannot be used to effectively control aquatic plants, algae, or invasive exotic plants. As used in this paragraph, the term "multimodal biological control" means the use of complementary native species to control aquatic plants, algae, or invasive exotic plants at the surface, middle, and bottom of an aquatic environment.
 - Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2019.
