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16	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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18	Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Historical
19	Memorials Protection Act."
20	Section 2. Section 265.71, Florida Statutes, is created to

22	265.71 Civil liability for damaging, destroying, or
23	removing memorials; enforcement.—
24	(1) As used in this section, the term:
25	(a) "Governing body" means a council, commission, or other

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board or body in which the general legislative powers of a local governmental entity are vested.

- (b) "Local governmental entity" means a municipality, county, school board, special district, and other local entity within the jurisdiction of one county created by general or special law or ordinance.
- (c) "Memorial" means a plaque, statue, marker, flag, banner, cenotaph, religious symbol, painting, seal, tombstone, structure name, or display that is constructed and located with the intent of being permanently displayed or perpetually maintained; is dedicated to a historical person, an entity, an event, or a series of events; and honors or recounts the military service of any past or present United States Armed Forces military personnel, or the past or present public service of a resident of the geographical area comprising the state or the United States. The term includes, but is not limited to, the following memorials established under this chapter:
 - 1. Florida Women's Hall of Fame.
 - 2. Florida Medal of Honor Wall.

- 3. Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame.
- 4. POW-MIA Chair of Honor Memorial.
- 5. Florida Veterans' Walk of Honor and Florida Veterans' Memorial Garden.
 - 6. Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame.
 - 7. Florida Holocaust Memorial.

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8. Florida Slavery Memorial.

- 9. Any other memorial located within the Capitol Complex, including, but not limited to, Waller Park.
- (2) Any person or entity that damages or destroys any memorial, or that removes a memorial without returning the memorial to its original position and condition, is liable for the full cost of repair or replacement of such memorial unless such person or entity was authorized to damage, destroy, or remove the memorial by the owner thereof.
- (3) In addition to the costs of repair or replacement, any person or entity that intentionally damages, destroys, takes, or removes a memorial without authorization from the owner thereof is liable for treble damages, attorney fees, and court costs to the owner of the memorial in any action or proceeding brought to recover damages for the cost of repair or replacement of a memorial in which the owner prevails and for attorney fees and court costs to any person or organization who prevails in an action brought under subsection (4).
- (4) A resident of the state, a historical preservation organization, a military veteran, a veterans' organization, or a law enforcement or firefighter benevolent organization has standing to seek enforcement of this section through civil action in the circuit court in the county in which a memorial that has been removed, damaged, or destroyed is located.
 - Section 3. Subsections (5) through (9) of section 806.13,

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Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (6) through (10), respectively, present subsection (8) is amended, and a new subsection (5) is added to that section, to read:

- 806.13 Criminal mischief; penalties; penalty for minor.-
- defaces, or removes by any means a memorial that is owned or erected by the state, a local governmental entity, a museum, a historical society, or a similar public or private organization, or a memorial that is located in a cemetery or on a grave or tombstone, commits a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084. For purposes of this subsection, the terms "local governmental entity" and "memorial" have the same meaning as in s. 265.71.
- (9) (8) A minor whose driver license or driving privilege is revoked, suspended, or withheld under subsection (8) (7) may elect to reduce the period of revocation, suspension, or withholding by performing community service at the rate of 1 day for each hour of community service performed. In addition, if the court determines that due to a family hardship, the minor's driver license or driving privilege is necessary for employment or medical purposes of the minor or a member of the minor's family, the court shall order the minor to perform community service and reduce the period of revocation, suspension, or withholding at the rate of 1 day for each hour of community service performed. As used in this subsection, the term

"community service" means cleaning graffiti from public
property, including graffiti on memorials, or the general
cleanup of parks dedicated to veterans or historic sites. For
purposes of this subsection, the term "memorial" has the same
meaning as in s. 265.71.
Section 4. This act shall take effect October 1, 2020.

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
