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A bill to be entitled An act relating to prescriptive authority certification for psychologists; creating s. 490.017, F.S.; defining terms; requiring the Board of Psychology to certify specified psychologists to exercise prescriptive authority; requiring the board to adopt rules relating to prescriptive authority certification; authorizing the board to require that a prescribing psychologist correct certain deficiencies under certain circumstances; specifying application requirements for certification; requiring the board to adopt a rule providing for certification renewal; requiring each applicant for renewal to demonstrate the completion of specified continuing education; specifying requirements for the prescribing of drugs and controlled substances by a prescribing psychologist; prohibiting specified prescribing actions; requiring a prescribing psychologist who is authorized to prescribe controlled substances to file his or her federal Drug Enforcement Administration registration number with the board within a certain timeframe; requiring the board to maintain a record of every prescribing psychologist authorized to prescribe controlled substances; requiring the Board of Psychology to transmit specified information to the Board of Pharmacy; requiring the Board of Psychology to establish an interim panel before a specified date; providing panel membership; requiring the panel to submit recommendations to the board by a specified

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date; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 490.017, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

- 490.017 Certification for prescriptive authority.-
- (1) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Clinical experience" means a period of supervised training and practice in which diagnoses and interventions are learned, conducted, and supervised by a psychologist.
- (b) "Controlled substance" has the same meaning as in s. 893.02.
 - (c) "Drug" has the same meaning as in s. 499.003.
- (d) "Prescribing psychologist" means a psychologist who has received from the board a certificate for prescriptive authority which has not been revoked or suspended.
 - (e) "Prescription" has the same meaning as in s. 465.003.
- (f) "Prescriptive authority" means the authorization to prescribe, administer, discontinue, or distribute drugs or controlled substances recognized or customarily used in the diagnosis, treatment, or management of an individual who has a psychiatric, mental, cognitive, nervous, emotional, developmental, or behavioral disorder within the scope of the practice of psychology.
 - (2) DUTIES OF THE BOARD.—The board shall:
- (a) Certify psychologists who meet the requirements listed in subsection (3) to exercise prescriptive authority.
 - (b) Develop and implement procedures to review education

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and training requirements for certification.

- (c) Adopt rules to deny, modify, suspend, or revoke prescriptive authority certification. The board may require remediation by a prescribing psychologist to correct deficiencies in his or her training or practice upon the board's determination that such deficiencies could reasonably be expected to jeopardize the health, safety, or welfare of the public.
 - (3) CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS.—
- (a) A psychologist who applies for prescriptive authority certification shall demonstrate by an official transcript or other official evidence deemed satisfactory by the board:
 - 1. A current license as a psychologist.
 - 2. Graduation from a doctoral program in psychology.
- 3. A passing score on an examination developed by a nationally recognized body, such as the Psychopharmacology Examination for Psychologists offered by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards, and approved by the board to establish competency in prescriptive authority.
- 4.a. Consistent with the American Psychological
 Association's established policies for education of
 psychologists in preparation for prescriptive authority, the
 successful completion of an organized sequence of study in a
 program offering intensive didactic education which includes
 core areas of instruction in basic sciences, neurosciences,
 physical examination, interpretation of laboratory tests,
 pathological basis of disease, clinical medicine, clinical
 neurotherapeutics, systems of care, pharmacology, clinical
 pharmacology, psychopharmacology, psychopharmacology research,

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and professional, ethical, and legal issues. The program must consist of an appropriate number of hours of didactic instruction, as determined by the board, to ensure the applicant has the knowledge and skills required to prescribe drugs in a safe and effective manner.

b. Consistent with the American Psychological Association's established policies for the training of psychologists in preparation for prescriptive authority, relevant clinical experience sufficient for the applicant to attain competency in the psychopharmacological treatment of a diverse patient population.

The educational and training requirements under this subparagraph may be met as part of a doctoral program in psychology or postdoctoral training or fellowship in psychology.

103 (b) A psychologist is exempt from the educational
104 requirements established under paragraph (a) if he or she:

- 1. Is a physician licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459, a nurse practitioner licensed under chapter 464, or another health care practitioner licensed under chapter 458, chapter 459, or chapter 464 who has comparable prescriptive authority.
- 2. Has completed the United States Department of Defense Psychopharmacology Demonstration Project.
 - (4) CERTIFICATION RENEWAL.—
- (a) The board shall establish by rule a method for the renewal of prescriptive authority certification, to occur in conjunction with licensure renewal pursuant to s. 490.007.
- (b) Each applicant for renewal shall present satisfactory evidence to the board demonstrating the completion of 20 hours

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117 of continuing education relevant to prescriptive authority 118 during the previous 2-year licensure period. 119 (5) PRESCRIPTION PRACTICES.— 120 (a) A prescribing psychologist may use his or her prescriptive authority certification in accordance with rules 122 adopted by the board. 123 (b) A prescribing psychologist shall: 1. Maintain a record of all of a patient's prescriptions. 125 2. Consult and collaborate with a patient's primary care 126 physician and concur with such physician before prescribing a 127 drug, altering a drug treatment plan, or discontinuing a drug. 128 (c) A prescribing psychologist may not: 1. Issue a prescription unless the psychologist holds a 129 valid and current prescriptive authority certification that has 130 not been revoked or suspended. 2. Delegate the authority to prescribe drugs to another 133 person. 134 3. Issue a prescription to a patient who does not have a 135 primary care physician. (d) A prescription issued by a prescribing psychologist 137 must: 1. Be written in a manner as determined by the board. 139 2. Comply with all applicable state and federal laws. (6) CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE PRESCRIPTION AUTHORITY.-

(b) The board shall maintain a current record of every

(a) When authorized to prescribe controlled substances, a

prescribing psychologist shall file with the board, within 10

days after such authorization, his or her federal Drug

Enforcement Administration registration number.

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prescribing psychologist authorized to prescribe controlled substances.

- (7) INTERACTION WITH THE BOARD OF PHARMACY.-
- (a) The board shall transmit to the Board of Pharmacy an initial list of prescribing psychologists which contains the following information:
 - 1. The psychologist's name.
 - 2. The psychologist's certification number.
- 3. The effective date of the psychologist's prescriptive authority.
- (b) The board shall promptly forward to the Board of

 Pharmacy any changes to the list, including changes relating to

 certification, revocation, suspension, or reinstatement of a

 psychologist's prescriptive authority.
- (8) INTERIM PANEL.—The board shall establish an interim panel by October 1, 2020, to provide recommendations for proposed rules governing prescriptive authority for psychologists. The interim panel shall consist of a psychiatrist licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459 and a pediatrician selected by the Board of Medicine, a pharmacist who holds a doctoral degree selected by the Board of Pharmacy, and two psychologists who hold postdoctoral master's degrees in clinical psychopharmacology selected by the Board of Psychology. The panel shall submit its recommendations for proposed rules to the board by February 1, 2021.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.
