27 (1) (a) Each public school that is a member of the Florida 28 High School Athletic Association (FHSAA) must have an 29 operational automated external defibrillator on the school 30 grounds. The defibrillator must be available in a clearly marked 31 and publicized location for each athletic contest, practice, 32 workout, or conditioning session, including those conducted 33 outside of the school year. Public and private partnerships are encouraged to cover the cost associated with the purchase and 34 35 placement of the defibrillator and training in the use of the 36 defibrillator.

37 (b) (2) Beginning June 1, 2021, a school employee or volunteer with current training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation 38 39 and use of a defibrillator must be present at each athletic 40 event during and outside of the school year, including athletic 41 contests, practices, workouts, and conditioning sessions. The 42 training must include Each school must ensure that all employees 43 or volunteers who are reasonably expected to use the device 44 obtain appropriate training, including completion of a course in 45 cardiopulmonary resuscitation or a basic first aid course that 46 includes cardiopulmonary resuscitation training, and demonstrated proficiency in the use of a an automated external 47 48 defibrillator. Each employee or volunteer who is reasonably 49 expected to use a defibrillator must complete this training. 50 (c) (3) The location of each automated external

52	services medical director. Each employee or volunteer required
53	to complete the training under paragraph (b) must annually be
54	notified in writing of the location of each defibrillator on

57	employees and volunteers is covered under ss. 768.13 and

59	(2)(a) In order to better protect student athletes
60	participating in athletics during hot weather and avoid
61	preventable injury or death, the FHSAA shall:

64	2. Establish guidelines for monitoring heat stress and
65	identify heat stress levels at which a school must make a

78	a minimum, the immediate availability of cold-water immersion
79	tubs or equivalent means to rapidly cool internal body

82	implement cold-water immersion.
83	6. Require each school's emergency action plan, as
84	required by the FHSAA, to include a procedure for onsite cooling
85	using cold-water immersion or equivalent means before a student
86	is transported to a hospital for exertional heat stroke.

88	The requirements of this paragraph apply year round.
89	(b) Each athletic coach and sponsor of extracurricular
90	activities involving outdoor practices or events shall annually

98	(c) The FHSAA shall adopt bylaws that require all students

101 satisfactorily pass a medical evaluation each year prior to 102 participating in interscholastic athletic competition or 103 engaging in any practice, tryout, workout, conditioning, or 104 other physical activity associated with the student's candidacy 105 for an interscholastic athletic team, including activities that 106 occur outside of the school year. Such medical evaluation may be 107 administered only by a practitioner licensed under chapter 458, 108 chapter 459, chapter 460, or s. 464.012, and in good standing with the practitioner's regulatory board. The bylaws shall 109 establish requirements for eliciting a student's medical history 110 and performing the medical evaluation required under this 111 112 paragraph, which shall include a physical assessment of the student's physical capabilities to participate in 113 114 interscholastic athletic competition as contained in a uniform 115 preparticipation physical evaluation and history form. The evaluation form shall incorporate the recommendations of the 116 117 American Heart Association for participation cardiovascular 118 screening and shall provide a place for the signature of the 119 practitioner performing the evaluation with an attestation that each examination procedure listed on the form was performed by 120 121 the practitioner or by someone under the direct supervision of 122 the practitioner. The form shall also contain a place for the practitioner to indicate if a referral to another practitioner 123 124 was made in lieu of completion of a certain examination 125 procedure. The form shall provide a place for the practitioner

126 to whom the student was referred to complete the remaining 127 sections and attest to that portion of the examination. The 128 preparticipation physical evaluation form shall advise students 129 to complete a cardiovascular assessment and shall include 130 information concerning alternative cardiovascular evaluation and 131 diagnostic tests. Results of such medical evaluation must be 132 provided to the school. A student is not eligible to 133 participate, as provided in s. 1006.15(3), in any 134 interscholastic athletic competition or engage in any practice, tryout, workout, or other physical activity associated with the 135 136 student's candidacy for an interscholastic athletic team until 137 the results of the medical evaluation have been received and 138 approved by the school.
