Paragraph (b) of subsection (3) of section 27 430.501, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 28 430.501 Alzheimer's Disease Advisory Committee; research 29 grants.-30 (3)31 The Governor shall appoint members from a broad (b)1. 32 cross-section of public, private, and volunteer sectors. All 33 nominations shall be forwarded to the Governor by the Secretary 34 of Elderly Affairs in accordance with this subsection. 35 2. Members shall be appointed to 4-year staggered terms in accordance with s. 20.052, except for the sitting members of the 36 37 Senate and House of Representatives, who shall be appointed to a term corresponding to their term of office. 38 39 3.
