WHEREAS, Article I of the United States Constitution grants the power and responsibility of declaring war to Congress, and

WHEREAS, our Founding Fathers understood the importance of vesting decisions about war in the legislative branch, as it represents the people who will bear the costs of conflict, and

WHEREAS, James Madison, the "Father of the Constitution," wrote to Thomas Jefferson in 1798, "the Executive is the branch of power most interested in war, and most prone to it. It has accordingly with studied care vested the question of war in the Legislature," and

WHEREAS, the terror attacks of September 11, 2001, justified a response by the United States in order to bring the perpetrators to justice, decimate al-Qaeda, and severely punish the Taliban, and

WHEREAS, on September 14, 2001, the 107th Congress passed the joint resolution entitled the Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMF) which authorized the President to "use all necessary and appropriate force against those nations, organizations, or persons he determines planned, authorized, committed, or aided the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11, 2001," and

WHEREAS, on September 18, 2001, the President of the United States signed the joint resolution into law and it is still in

effect as of today, and

WHEREAS, the military has accomplished these principal strategic objectives through the valiant sacrifices of servicemembers, but the United States' continued nation-building attempts in Afghanistan have resulted in the longest war in American history, and

WHEREAS, less than a fifth of the current members of Congress voted on the 2001 AUMF, and

WHEREAS, due to its broad and nonspecific language, the 2001 AUMF has been invoked more than 41 times to deploy our troops to more than 19 countries, far exceeding the intended scope of the act envisioned by its drafters, and

WHEREAS, the decision to put members of the Armed Forces in harm's way is among the most important votes a legislator can take, and

WHEREAS, Florida is home to 21 military bases, with an estimated 68,000 active duty servicemembers and more than 1.5 million veterans, and

WHEREAS, the post-9/11 wars that the United States has engaged in have carried a heavy price, including more than 7,000 servicemembers lost and more than 53,000 wounded, an estimated 1.1 million veterans who have developed service-connected disabilities, and expenditures of more than \$6.4 trillion, and

WHEREAS, the costs of these open-ended conflicts include an increase in the incidence of posttraumatic stress disorder, faced by nearly a quarter of Iraq and Afghanistan veterans, and veterans' suicides, which increased a shocking 43 percent between 2005 and 2017, to nearly 17 daily, and

WHEREAS, nearly 70 percent of Americans support bringing

the country's troops home from Afghanistan, according to polls administered in 2020 by YouGov and the Charles Koch Institute, and more than 73 percent of veterans favor withdrawal, according to polling done in 2020 by Concerned Veterans for America, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the Florida Senate urges Congress and the President of the United States to repeal the 2001 Authorization for Use of Military Force and to ensure that any future authorizations for use of military force feature country- and mission-specific language and automatic sunsets to require periodic review, debate, and approval votes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Florida Senate calls upon the President of the United States to continue to follow through on the progress made since February 2020 toward a full withdrawal from Afghanistan and to bring endless wars to a conclusion.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Florida Senate reaffirms its support of and pride in the nation's military forces who have sworn to protect and defend our freedom and prosperity.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of State dispatch copies of this memorial to the President of the United States, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress.
