17	Section 1. Subsections (12) and (13) are added to section
18	943.0583, Florida Statutes, and subsections (10) and (11) of
19	that section are republished, to read:
20	943.0583 Human trafficking victim expunction
21	(10)(a) A criminal history record ordered expunged under
22	this section that is retained by the department is confidential
23	and exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State
24	Constitution, except that the record shall be made available:
25	1. To criminal justice agencies for their respective
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26 criminal justice purposes.

27 2. To any governmental agency that is authorized by state 28 or federal law to determine eligibility to purchase or possess a 29 firearm or to carry a concealed firearm for use in the course of 30 such agency's official duties.

3. Upon order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

32 (b) A criminal justice agency may retain a notation33 indicating compliance with an order to expunge.

(11) (a) The following criminal intelligence information or criminal investigative information is confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution:

38 1. Any information that reveals the identity of a person 39 who is a victim of human trafficking whose criminal history 40 record has been expunged under this section.

Any information that may reveal the identity of a
person who is a victim of human trafficking whose criminal
history record has been ordered expunged under this section.

(b) Criminal investigative information and criminal
intelligence information made confidential and exempt under this
subsection may be disclosed by a law enforcement agency:

47 1. In the furtherance of its official duties and48 responsibilities.

49 2. For print, publication, or broadcast if the law50 enforcement agency determines that such release would assist in

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51 locating or identifying a person that the agency believes to be 52 missing or endangered. The information provided should be 53 limited to that needed to identify or locate the victim.

54 3. To another governmental agency in the furtherance of55 its official duties and responsibilities.

(c) This exemption applies to such confidential and exempt criminal intelligence information or criminal investigative information held by a law enforcement agency before, on, or after the effective date of the exemption.

60 The expansion of the public records exemptions in (12)subsections (10) and (11) pursuant to paragraph (3) (b) to allow 61 for the expunction of certain criminal history records related 62 to an offense listed in s. 775.084(1)(b)1. is subject to the 63 64 Open Government Sunset Review Act in accordance with s. 119.15 65 and shall stand repealed on October 2, 2027, unless reviewed and 66 saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature. If the 67 expansion of the exemptions pursuant to paragraph (3)(b) is not 68 saved from repeal, this section shall revert to that in 69 existence on June 30, 2022, except that any amendment to this 70 section other than by this act shall be preserved and continue to operate to the extent that such amendments are not dependent 71 72 upon the portions of this section that are repealed pursuant to 73 this subsection. 74 (13) (a) A petition filed under this section and all 75 pleadings and documents related to the petition are confidential

The Legislature finds that it is a public necessity that criminal history records of human trafficking 83 84 victims related to any offense listed in s. 775.084(1)(b)1., 85 Florida Statutes, which were dismissed or nolle prosequi by the 86 state attorney or statewide prosecutor or dismissed by a court of competent jurisdiction, or for which a judgment of acquittal 87 was rendered by a judge or a verdict of not guilty was rendered 88 89 by a judge or jury, which records are ordered to be expunged 90 under s. 943.0583, Florida Statutes, be made confidential and 91 exempt from s. 119.07(1), Florida Statutes, and s. 24(a), 92 Article I of the State Constitution. Further, the Legislature 93 finds that it is a public necessity that a petition filed under 94 s. 943.0583, Florida Statutes, and all pleadings and documents 95 related to the petition be made confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1), Florida Statutes, and s. 24(a), Article I of the 96 97 State Constitution. Persons who are victims of human trafficking 98 and who have been arrested for offenses committed, or reported 99 to have been committed, as a result of being trafficked are themselves victims of crimes. These victims face barriers to 100

101	employment and loss of other life opportunities, and the fact
102	that the victims are seeking expungement, as well as the
103	information contained in related pleadings and documents, would
104	expose these victims to possible discrimination due to details
105	of their past lives becoming public knowledge. Therefore, it is
106	necessary that these petitions, pleadings, and related documents
107	be made confidential in order for human trafficking victims to
108	have the chance to rebuild their lives and reenter society.
109	Section 3. This act shall take effect on the same date
110	that HB 1439 or similar legislation takes effect, if such
111	legislation is adopted in the same legislative session or an
112	extension thereof and becomes a law.

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
