(b) "Unlicensed person" means an individual not currently licensed to practice nursing or medicine who is employed by or under contract to a home health agency and who has received training with respect to assisting with the self-administration of medication <u>or other tasks</u> as provided by agency rule.

21 Patients who are capable of self-administering their (2) 22 own medications and performing other tasks without assistance shall be encouraged and allowed to do so. However, an unlicensed 23 24 person may, consistent with a dispensed prescription's label or 25 the package directions of an over-the-counter medication, assist a patient whose condition is medically stable with the self-26 27 administration of routine, regularly scheduled medications that 28 are intended to be self-administered. An unlicensed person may 29 also provide assistance with other tasks specified in subsection 30 (6). Assistance with self-administration of medication or such 31 other tasks self-medication by an unlicensed person may occur 32 only upon a documented request by, and the written informed consent of, a patient or the patient's surrogate, guardian, or 33 34 attorney in fact. For purposes of this section, self-35 administered medications include both legend and over-thecounter oral dosage forms, topical dosage forms, transdermal 36 patches, and topical ophthalmic, otic, and nasal dosage forms, 37 including solutions, suspensions, sprays, inhalers, and 38 39 nebulizer treatments.

(a) Taking the medication, in its previously dispensed,
properly labeled container, from where it is stored and bringing

syringe that is prefilled with the proper dosage by a pharmacist

considered medications in previously dispensed, properly labeled
