> government while encouraging the elected and appointed officials of local governments in this state to take appropriate actions when meeting with Cuban officials who represent a government with a history of brutality to avoid giving the impression of condoning the Cuban government's tyranny and cruel oppression of its people.

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> WHEREAS, on January 1, 1959, Fidel Castro and his querilla army overthrew dictator Fulgencio Batista's government in Havana, Cuba, and on February 16, 1959, Fidel Castro was sworn in as Cuba's prime minister, and

WHEREAS, after flirting with building relationships with the United States and other nations, the Cuban government in 1960 officially became an ally of the former Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (Soviet Union), with Fidel Castro officially announcing the alliance on March 1, 1961, and

WHEREAS, Cuba's relationship with the Soviet Union, a country founded on communist principles that saw the closing of churches and schools indoctrinating school-age children, continued until the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, which began the "Special Period" of financial and political crisis in Cuba, and

WHEREAS, Fidel Castro engaged, and the regime continues to engage, in abominable human rights violations, including the execution or indefinite detainment of many persons opposing the regime, and

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WHEREAS, on February 24, 2008, Fidel Castro handed over the reins of the Cuban government to his brother, Raul Castro, who was elected president by the National Assembly, and today, Miquel Diaz-Canel, who succeeded Raul Castro as president in 2018, serves in that capacity and as secretary of the Central Committee of the Cuban Communist Party, and

WHEREAS, on January 12, 2021, the United States Government officially listed Cuba as a state sponsor of terrorism alongside Iran, North Korea, and Syria, and

WHEREAS, the United States Secretary of State has determined that Cuba repeatedly provided support for acts of international terrorism, and

WHEREAS, on July 11, 2021, a series of protests against the Cuban regime erupted on the island, marking the first time in 60 years that ordinary Cubans dared to publicly rise up against their government over its political oppression, including the arrests of thousands who were never heard from again, food shortages, rising prices of goods and commodities, the lack of access to medicines, and unreliable electricity, and

WHEREAS, Cubans all over the world joined their compatriots in protests against the oppressive and tyrannical Cuban government, shouting, "; Patria y vida!" appropriating and changing Fidel Castro's slogan of "Patria o muerte," made famous during his takeover of Cuba, and

WHEREAS, on March 3, 2023, a group of Cuban officials, led by Cuban Ambassador Lianys Torres Rivera, had a dinner meeting with local Tampa officials and business leaders at an upscale Tampa restaurant, and

WHEREAS, as word spread of the meeting, a protest erupted

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at the restaurant, with outraged protestors confronting the ambassador and her delegation, shouting at them and demanding to know why tens of thousands of Cubans are being held as political prisoners by their own government in violation of human rights laws, and

WHEREAS, the Cuban delegation requested this meeting to discuss travel restrictions and remittances to the island nation, and

WHEREAS, the Cuban delegation and those in the meeting were attempting to open the door to establishing cultural and business ties with the United States in areas of this state willing to entertain such exploratory discussions, and

WHEREAS, it may be important for local officials and business leaders in this state to meet with representatives of foreign governments to give them the opportunity to make their case for improved relations and to foster better understanding of their positions, which at times may require face-to-face meetings to allow them to explore the possibility of forming future relationships, NOW, THEREFORE,
