40	Section 1. Section 430.5025, Florida Statutes, is created
41	to read:
42	430.5025 Alzheimer's disease and related forms of
43	dementia; education and training
44	(1) This section may be cited as the "Alzheimer's Disease
45	and Related Forms of Dementia Education and Training Act."
46	(2) As used in this section, the term:
47	(a) "Covered provider" means a nursing home, a home health
48	agency, a nurse registry, a companion or homemaker service
49	provider, a health care services pool, an assisted living
50	facility, an adult family-care home, or an adult day care center

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51	licensed or registered under chapter 400 or chapter 429.
52	(b) "Department" means the Department of Elderly Affairs.
53	(c) "Personal care" means providing, through in-person
54	contact, assistance with activities of daily living, assistance
55	with self-administration of medication, homemaker or companion
56	services, nursing services, or other services that promote the
57	physical, mental, and psychosocial well-being of participants,
58	patients, and residents of covered providers. The term does not
59	include duties involving administrative functions or maintaining
60	the physical environment of a licensed facility, including
61	grounds maintenance, building maintenance, housekeeping,
62	laundry, or food preparation.
63	(d) "Employee" means a person, contracted staff, or an
64	independent contractor employed or referred by a covered
65	provider who is required to undergo a level 2 background
66	screening under s. 408.809 and chapter 435.
67	(e) "Regular contact" means the performance of duties
68	other than personal care that may require employees to interact
69	in person on a daily basis with participants, patients, or
70	residents.
71	(3) The department shall offer to the general public
72	education about Alzheimer's disease and related forms of
73	dementia. Such education must provide basic information about
74	the most common forms of dementia, how to identify the signs and
75	symptoms of dementia, coping skills, how to respond to changes,

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76	planning for the future, and how to access additional resources
77	about dementia.
78	(4) Employees of covered providers must complete the
79	following training for Alzheimer's disease and related forms of
80	dementia:
81	(a) Upon beginning employment, each employee must receive
82	basic written information about interacting with persons who
83	have Alzheimer's disease or related forms of dementia.
84	(b) Within 30 days after beginning employment, each
85	employee who provides personal care to or has regular contact
86	with participants, patients, or residents must complete a 1-hour
87	training program provided by the department.
88	1. The department shall provide training that is available
89	online at no cost. The 1-hour training program shall contain
90	information on understanding the basics about the most common
91	forms of dementia, how to identify the signs and symptoms of
92	dementia, and skills for communicating and interacting with
93	persons with Alzheimer's disease or related forms of dementia. A
94	record of the completion of the training program must be made
95	available to the covered provider which identifies the training
96	curricula, the name of the employee, and the date of completion.
97	2. A covered provider must maintain a record of the
98	employee's completion of the training program and, upon written
99	request of the employee, provide the employee with a copy of the
100	record of completion consistent with the employer's written

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101	policies.
102	3. An employee who has completed the training required in
103	this subsection is not required to repeat the program upon
104	changing employment to a different covered provider.
105	(c) Within 7 months after beginning employment for a home
106	health agency, nurse registry, or companion or homemaker service
107	provider, each employee who provides personal care must complete
108	2 hours of training in addition to the training required in
109	paragraphs (a) and (b). The additional training must include,
110	but is not limited to, behavior management, promoting the
111	person's independence in activities of daily living, and skills
112	in working with families and caregivers.
113	(d) Within 7 months after beginning employment for a
114	nursing home, an assisted living facility, an adult family-care
115	home, or an adult day care center, each employee who provides
116	personal care must complete 3 hours of training in addition to
117	the training required in paragraphs (a) and (b). The additional
118	training must include, but is not limited to, behavior
119	management, promoting the person's independence in activities of
120	daily living, skills in working with families and caregivers,
121	group and individual activities, maintaining an appropriate
122	environment, and ethical issues.
123	(e) For an assisted living facility, adult family-care
124	home, or adult day care center that advertises and provides, or
125	is designated to provide, specialized care for persons with
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126	Alzheimer's disease or related forms of dementia, in addition to
127	the training specified in paragraphs (a) and (b), employees must
128	receive the following training:
129	1. Within 3 months after beginning employment, each
130	employee who provides personal care to or has regular contact
131	with the residents or participants must complete the additional
132	<u>3 hours of training as provided in paragraph (d).</u>
133	2. Within 6 months after beginning employment, each

135	4 hours of dementia-specific training. Such training must
