Section 1. Task Force on Missing and Murdered African-American Women.—

Murdered African-American Women, a task force as defined in s. 20.03(8), Florida Statutes, is created within the Department of Law Enforcement to advise the executive director of the Department of Law Enforcement and report to the Legislature on

- b. A statewide or local organization that provides advocacy or counseling for African-American women and girls who have been victims of violence;
- c. A statewide or local organization that provides services to African-American women and girls; or
- d. An African-American woman who is a survivor of gender violence.
- (b) Members of the task force serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority or until the task force expires. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.
  - (3) OFFICERS; MEETINGS.—
- (a) The task force members shall annually elect a chair and vice chair from among the task force's members and may elect other officers as necessary. The task force shall meet at least quarterly, or upon the call of its chair, and may hold meetings throughout the state. The task force shall meet as many times as it deems necessary to complete the duties provided in subsection (4).
- (b) The task force shall seek out and enlist the cooperation and assistance of nongovernmental organizations, community and advocacy organizations working with the African-American community, and academic researchers and experts, specifically those specializing in violence against African-American women and girls, those representing diverse communities

disproportionately affected by violence against women and girls, or those focusing on issues relating to gender violence and violence against African-American women and girls.

- (c) The first meeting of the task force shall convene no later than October 1, 2024. The Department of Law Enforcement shall provide meeting space and administrative assistance as necessary for the task force to conduct its work.
- (4) DUTIES.—The task force must examine and report on the following:
- (a) The systemic causes behind violence against AfricanAmerican women and girls, including patterns and underlying
  factors that explain why disproportionately high levels of
  violence occur against African-American women and girls,
  including underlying historical, social, economic,
  institutional, and cultural factors that may contribute to such
  violence.
- (b) Appropriate methods for tracking and collecting data on violence against African-American women and girls, including data on missing and murdered African-American women and girls.
- (c) Institutions such as police, child welfare agencies, coroners, and other governmental institutions and their policies and practices that impact violence against African-American women and girls and the investigation and prosecution of crimes of gender violence against African-Americans.
  - (d) Measures necessary to address and reduce or eliminate

violence against African-American women and girls.

- (e) Measures to help victims, victims' families, and victims' communities prevent and heal from violence that occurs against African-American women and girls.
- ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over public safety, human services, and state government on the work of the task force, including, but not limited to, the issues to be examined as specified in this section, and shall include in the report institutional policies and practices or proposed institutional policies and practices that are effective in reducing gender violence and increasing the safety of African-American women and girls. The report shall include recommendations to reduce or eliminate violence against African-American women and girls and help victims and communities heal from gender violence and violence against African-American women and girls. The report shall be submitted to the legislative committees by December 15, 2025.
- (6) EXPIRATION.—The task force and this section expire on December 31, 2025.
- Section 2. For Fiscal Year 2024-2025, the sum of \$150,000 is appropriated to the Department of Law Enforcement from the General Revenue Fund to implement this act.
  - Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
