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A bill to be entitled An act relating to art therapy; providing a short title; providing legislative findings and intent; amending s. 491.003, F.S.; defining the term "professional art therapist"; amending s. 491.004, F.S.; requiring the appointment of a licensed practicing professional art therapist to the board; creating s. 491.019, F.S.; providing definitions; requiring the Department of Health to license professional art therapists and register art therapist interns if they meet specified requirements; requiring an art therapist intern to practice under supervision until he or she is licensed as a professional art therapist; providing for licensure by endorsement; requiring the board to waive licensure requirements for certain applicants; requiring the board and department to adopt rules establishing requirements for the annual renewal of professional art therapist licenses and art therapist intern registrations; providing continuing education requirements; providing for inactive licenses and license reactivation; providing for license denial and disciplinary action; prohibiting the practice of professional art therapy for compensation and the use of certain titles, letters, abbreviations, and insignia without a valid,

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active license; providing criminal penalties; providing construction; exempting certain persons from licensure and registration requirements; requiring the board and department to adopt rules; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Professional Art Therapist Licensure Act."

Section 2. The Legislature finds that understanding the power of art and art making to stimulate memories and reveal emotions, and the skill to safely manage and interpret the reactions different art processes may evoke, are competencies unique to professionally trained art therapists. The Legislature further finds that the practice of professional art therapy presents a danger to public health, safety, and welfare if applied beyond the competence of a professional art therapist or if applied by an individual without the appropriate training. It is the intent of this act to secure the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and to assist the public in making informed choices regarding art therapy services, by establishing minimum qualifications for entry into and continuing practice of professional art therapy.

Section 3. Subsections (11) through (18) of section

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491.003, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (12) through (19), respectively, and a new subsection (11) is added to that section to read:

- (11) "Professional art therapist" means a person licensed under this chapter to practice professional art therapy.
- Section 4. The first art therapist member appointed to the Board of Clinical Social Work, Marriage and Family Therapy, and Mental Health Counseling under s. 491.004, Florida Statutes, as amended by this act, must meet all qualifications to obtain a license pursuant to s. 491.019(2), Florida Statutes.
- Section 5. Subsections (1), (2), and (3) of section 491.004, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:
- 491.004 Board of Clinical Social Work, Marriage and Family Therapy, and Mental Health Counseling.—
- (1) There is created within the department the Board of Clinical Social Work, Marriage and Family Therapy, and Mental Health Counseling composed of  $\underline{10}$  nine members appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.
- (2)(a) Seven Six members of the board shall be persons licensed under this chapter as follows:
- 1. Two members shall be licensed practicing clinical social workers.
- 2. Two members shall be licensed practicing marriage and family therapists.
  - 3. Two members shall be licensed practicing mental health

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- $\underline{\text{4.}}$  One member shall be a licensed practicing professional art therapist.
- (b) Three members shall be citizens of the state who are not and have never been licensed in a mental health-related profession and who are in no way connected with the practice of any such profession.
- (3) No later than January 1, 1988, The Governor shall appoint 11 nine members of the board as follows:
  - (a) Three members for terms of 2 years each.
  - (b) Three members for terms of 3 years each.
  - (c) Three members for terms of 4 years each.
- (d) Two licensed practicing professional art therapist member for a term of 4 years.
- Section 6. Section 491.019, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
  - 491.019 Professional art therapy.-
  - (1) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Art therapist intern" means a person registered under subsection (3) who is completing the post-master's clinical experience pursuant to paragraph (2)(c).
- (b) "Board-certified art therapist" means an individual who holds a credential in good standing with the Art Therapy Credentials Board, Inc., or any successor organization.
  - (c) "Licensed professional art therapist" means an

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individual who is licensed under this chapter to engage in the practice of professional art therapy.

- integrated use of psychotherapeutic principles and methods with specialized graduate training in art media, the neurobiological implications of art making, and art-based assessment models in the assessment, diagnosis, prevention, treatment, and amelioration of mental, developmental, behavioral, and emotional disorders and conditions in clients of all ages. The term includes:
- 1. The use of therapeutic art interventions to facilitate alternative modes of receptive and expressive communication which can circumvent the limitations of verbal articulation and implementation of art-based treatment plans to help clients improve cognitive, sensory, and motor functions; reduce symptoms of depression, anxiety, posttraumatic stress, and attachment disorders; enhance neurological, cognitive, and verbal abilities; foster self-esteem and self-awareness; cultivate emotional resilience; reduce and resolve conflicts, distress, and grief; and enhance educational performance and social functioning.
- 2. Psychological methods used to evaluate, assess,
  diagnose, treat, and prevent emotional and mental disorders or
  dysfunctions, including cognitive, affective, and behavioral
  disorders, alcoholism, and substance abuse, when used within the

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context and practice provided under subparagraph 1.

- 3. Consultation, client advocacy, crisis intervention, provision of needed information and education to clients, art-based treatments that relate to multicultural populations, program evaluation, and applied research, when used within the context and practice provided under subparagraph 1.
- (2) The department shall issue a professional art therapist license to an applicant who the board certifies has met all of the following requirements:
  - (a) Has submitted a completed application.
- (b) Holds a minimum of a master's degree from an accredited college or university in:
- 1. An art therapy program that was approved by the

  American Art Therapy Association or accredited by the Commission
  on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs at the time
  the degree was conferred; or
- 2. A program that is substantially equivalent to an approved or accredited program in art therapy, as determined by rule of the board.
- (c) Has completed at least 2 years of clinical experience in professional art therapy, which must be at the post-master's level under the supervision of a licensed practicing professional art therapist, a board-certified art therapist, or another qualified mental health professional, as determined by rule of the board. A doctoral internship may qualify as clinical

professional art therapist.

(4) (a) The department shall issue a license by endorsement to an applicant who the board certifies has met all of the following requirements:

1. Has submitted a completed application.

- 2. Holds a professional art therapist license in good standing, or its equivalent, issued by another state or jurisdiction, if the qualifications for licensure in such other state or jurisdiction are equal to or greater than those specified in subsection (2).
- 3. Has demonstrated, in a manner designated by rule of the board, knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice of clinical social work, marriage and family therapy, mental health counseling, and professional art therapy.
- 4. Has actively engaged in the practice of professional art therapy in such other state or jurisdiction for 3 of the 5 years immediately preceding his or her application for licensure by endorsement under this subsection.
- 5. Is not under investigation for, and has not been found guilty of, any act that would constitute a violation of this chapter.
- (b) The department shall waive the requirements of subsection (2) and issue a professional art therapist license to an applicant who, before July 1, 2025, submits a completed application and demonstrates to the board that he or she has met all of the following requirements:

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1. Has passed the Art Therapy Credentials Board

Examination offered by the Art Therapy Credentials Board, Inc.,
or an examination offered by any successor organization.

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- 2. Has engaged in the practice of professional art therapy for at least 5 years, which may include up to 1 year of practice under supervision, as determined by rule of the board.
- 3. Has completed appropriate training, as determined by rule of the board, in the assessment, diagnosis, treatment, or resolution of mental, behavioral, and emotional disorders and dysfunctions as part of the approved course of study for his or her master's or doctoral degree or following completion of such degree.
- 4. Has demonstrated, in a manner designated by rule of the board, knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice of clinical social work, marriage and family therapy, mental health counseling, and professional art therapy.
- 5. Is not under investigation for, and has not been found guilty of, any act that would constitute a violation of this chapter.
- (5)(a) The board or department shall adopt rules establishing requirements for the annual renewal of professional art therapist licenses.
- (b)1. An applicant for license renewal shall present satisfactory evidence that, in the period since the license was issued, the applicant has completed continuing education

- 3. Disclosing confidential information including, but not limited to, records, artwork, verbal or artistic expression, or assessment interpretations developed within the client-therapist relationship without the client's explicit consent, except as mandated by law or court order.
- (b) The department may enter an order denying licensure or imposing any of the penalties in s. 456.072(2) against any applicant for licensure, licensee, or registered intern who is found guilty of violating paragraph (a) or s. 456.072(1).
  - (8)(a) A person may not:

- 1. Practice professional art therapy for compensation unless the person holds a valid, active license issued pursuant to subsection (2) or subsection (4) or is a registered art therapist intern pursuant to subsection (3).
- 2. Use the title "licensed professional art therapist," "professional art therapist," or "licensed art therapist," or use any letters, abbreviations, or insignia to represent himself or herself as licensed to practice professional art therapy, unless he or she holds a valid, active license issued pursuant to subsection (2) or subsection (4) or is a registered art therapist intern pursuant to subsection (3).
- 3. Use the title "registered art therapist intern,"

  "registered art therapist," or "art therapist intern," or use

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276 any letters, abbreviations, or insignia to represent himself or
277 herself as a registered art therapist intern, unless he or she
278 holds a valid, active registration issued pursuant to subsection
279 (3).

4. Present as his or her own the professional art therapist license or art therapist intern registration of another.

- 5. Give false or forged evidence to the department or the board, or a member thereof, for the purpose of obtaining a license or registration.
- 6. Use or attempt to use a license or registration issued pursuant to this section which has been revoked or suspended.
- 7. Knowingly conceal information relative to violations of this section.
- (b) A person who violates paragraph (a) commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
- (c) The department may institute appropriate judicial proceedings to enjoin violations of this subsection.
- (9) This section does not restrict the activities or practice of an individual licensed or certified under this chapter or any other law of this state from engaging in the profession or practice for which he or she is licensed or certified if he or she is providing services that are within the scope of practice of his or her license or certification and

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consistent with his or her professional training and if the individual does not hold himself or herself out to the public as a licensed professional art therapist or registered art therapist intern under this section.

- (10) The following persons are not required to be licensed to practice professional art therapy or to be registered art therapist interns under this section:
- (a) A salaried employee of a government agency; a developmental disability facility or program; a domestic violence center certified pursuant to chapter 39; a mental health, alcohol, or drug abuse facility operating under chapter 393, chapter 394, or chapter 397; a child-placing or child-caring agency licensed pursuant to chapter 409; the statewide child care resource and referral network operating under s.

  1002.92; an accredited academic institution; or a research institution, if such employee is performing duties for which he or she was trained and hired solely within the confines of such agency, facility, program, center, network, or institution, so long as the employee is not held out to the public as a registered art therapist intern or licensed professional art therapist.
- (b) A salaried employee of a private, nonprofit organization providing counseling services to children, youth, and families, if such services are provided for no charge and such employee is performing duties for which he or she was

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- (c) A student providing professional art therapy services regulated under this section who is enrolled in a post-master's or doctoral program in professional art therapy if such services are provided under supervision as part of an approved course of study.
- (d) A nonresident of this state who offers professional
  art therapy services in this state if all of the following
  requirements are met:
- 1. The nonresident is licensed or certified to practice professional art therapy in another state or territory of the United States or in a foreign country or province.
- 2. Such services are performed for no more than 15 days in any calendar year.
- (11) The board and department shall adopt rules to administer this section.
