1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to religious expression and classroom 3 requirements in K-12 schools; providing short titles; 4 prohibiting a school district from discriminating 5 against students, parents, or school personnel on the 6 basis of religious viewpoints or religious expression; 7 prohibiting penalty or reward for a student's 8 religious expression in coursework, artwork, and other 9 specified assignments; authorizing a student to wear 10 clothing, accessories, and jewelry that display 11 religious messages or symbols; authorizing a student 12 to pray or engage in religious activities or expression; authorizing school personnel to engage in 13 14 such activities or expression with a student under 15 specified circumstances; authorizing a student to 16 organize prayer groups, religious clubs, and other 17 religious gatherings; prohibiting a school district from preventing school personnel from participating in 18 voluntary, student-initiated religious activities on 19 school grounds under specified circumstances; 20 21 requiring that a school district provide religious 22 groups with equal access to school facilities; 23 authorizing religious groups to advertise or announce 24 meetings in the same manner and to the same extent as 25 secular groups; requiring that a school district adopt

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26 a limited public forum policy and deliver a disclaimer 27 at school events; requiring the Department of 28 Education to develop and publish a model policy 29 regarding a limited public forum and religious 30 expression; requiring that each district school board 31 adopt and implement such model policy; amending s. 32 1003.44, F.S.; requiring the national anthem to be 33 played at the beginning of each school day after the completion of the moment of silence; requiring 34 35 students to be provided written notice of the right to 36 not participate in specified activities; requiring 37 students to be excused from specified activities upon written request; authorizing excused students to stand 38 39 outside the classroom door for specified activities; 40 requiring such students to immediately return to the 41 classroom after such activities; requiring public 42 schools to comply with certain provisions by a 43 specified date; providing penalties for noncompliance; requiring school districts to conduct a public 44 45 awareness campaign for specified purposes; providing requirements for the display of the state motto in 46 47 certain portions of schools; requiring the department 48 to provide certain materials; providing an effective 49 date.

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51 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 52 53 Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Florida Religious 54 Liberty Awareness and Activation Act." 55 Section 2. Religious expression in public schools.-56 This section may be cited as the "Florida Student and (1) 57 School Personnel Religious Liberties Act." 58 (2) A school district may not discriminate against a 59 student, parent, or school personnel on the basis of a religious 60 viewpoint or religious expression. A school district shall treat a student's voluntary expression of a religious viewpoint on an 61 62 otherwise permissible subject in the same manner that the school 63 district treats a student's voluntary expression of a secular 64 viewpoint. (3) (a) A student may express his or her religious beliefs 65 66 in coursework, artwork, and other written and oral assignments 67 free from discrimination. A student's homework and classroom 68 assignments shall be evaluated, regardless of their religious 69 content, based on expected academic standards relating to the 70 course curriculum and requirements. A student may not be 71 penalized or rewarded based on the religious content of his or 72 her work if the coursework, artwork, or other written or oral 73 assignments require a student's viewpoint to be expressed. A student may wear clothing, accessories, and jewelry 74 (b) 75 that display a religious message or symbol in the same manner

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76 and to the same extent that clothing, accessories, and jewelry 77 that display a secular message or symbol are permitted to be 78 worn. 79 (4) (a) A student may pray or engage in religious activities or expression before, during, and after the school 80 81 day in the same manner and to the same extent that a student may 82 engage in secular activities or expression. School personnel, 83 including classroom teachers and athletic coaches, may pray or 84 engage in religious activities or expressions with a student if 85 such prayer or religious activity or expression does not occur during instructional time. A student may organize prayer groups, 86 87 religious clubs, and other religious gatherings before, during, 88 and after the school day in the same manner and to the same 89 extent that a student is permitted to organize secular 90 activities and groups. 91 (b)1. A school district may not prevent school personnel 92 from participating in religious activities on school grounds 93 that are initiated by students at reasonable times before or 94 after the school day if such activities are voluntary and do not 95 conflict with the responsibilities or assignments of such 96 personnel. 97 2. A school district shall comply with the federal 98 requirements in Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which 99 prohibit an employer from discriminating against an employee on 100 the basis of religion.

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101 A school district shall provide a religious group with (C) 102 access to the same school facilities for assembling as provided 103 to secular groups without discrimination based on the religious 104 content of the group's expression. A group that meets for prayer 105 or other religious speech may advertise or announce its meetings 106 in the same manner and to the same extent that a secular group 107 may advertise or announce its meetings. 108 (5) (a) A school district shall adopt a policy that 109 establishes a limited public forum for student speakers at any 110 school event at which a student is to speak publicly. The 111 limited public forum policy shall require the school district 112 to: 1. Provide the forum in a manner that does not 113 114 discriminate against a student's voluntary expression of a 115 religious viewpoint on an otherwise permissible subject; 116 2. Provide a method based on neutral criteria for the 117 selection of student speakers at school events, activities, and 118 graduation ceremonies; 119 3. Ensure that a student speaker does not engage in 120 obscene, vulgar, offensively lewd, or indecent speech; and 121 4. State in written or oral form that the student's speech 122 does not reflect the endorsement, sponsorship, position, or 123 expression of the school district. 124 The school district shall deliver the disclaimer (b) 125 required in subparagraph (a)4. at all graduation events and any

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126 other event at which a student speaks publicly. 127 (C) Student expression of a religious viewpoint on an 128 otherwise permissible subject may not be excluded from the 129 limited public forum. 130 (6) The Department of Education shall develop a model policy regarding a limited public forum and voluntary expression 131 132 of religious viewpoints by students and school personnel in 133 public schools pursuant to this section. The department shall 134 publish the model policy on its website. Each district school 135 board shall adopt and implement the department's model policy. 136 Section 3. Subsections (1) and (4) of section 1003.44, 137 Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 138 1003.44 Patriotic programs; rules.-139 (1) (a) 1. Each district school board may adopt rules to 140 require, in all of the schools of the district, programs of a patriotic nature to encourage greater respect for the government 141 142 of the United States and its national anthem and flag, subject 143 always to other existing pertinent laws of the United States or 144 of the state. 145 2. The national anthem must be played at the beginning of 146 each school day after the completion of the moment of silence 147 pursuant to s. 1003.45. When the national anthem is played, students and all civilians shall stand at attention, men 148 removing the headdress, except when such headdress is worn for 149 150 religious purposes.

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151 The pledge of allegiance to the flag, "I pledge 3. 152 allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to 153 the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, 154 indivisible, with liberty and justice for all," shall be 155 rendered by students standing with the right hand over the 156 heart. The pledge of allegiance to the flag shall be recited at the beginning of the day in each public elementary, middle, and 157 158 high school in the state. Each student shall be informed by a 159 written notice published in the student handbook or a similar publication pursuant to s. 1006.07(2) that the student has the 160 161 right not to participate in reciting the pledge. Upon written 162 request by his or her parent, the student must be excused from reciting the pledge, including standing and placing the right 163 164 hand over his or her heart. When the pledge is given, unexcused 165 students must show full respect to the flag by standing at 166 attention, men removing the headdress, except when such 167 headdress is worn for religious purposes, as provided by Pub. L. 168 ch. 77-435, s. 7, approved June 22, 1942, 56 Stat. 377, as 169 amended by Pub. L. ch. 77-806, 56 Stat. 1074, approved December 170 22, 1942. 171 4. Each student shall be informed by a written notice published in the student handbook or a similar publication 172 173 pursuant to s. 1006.07(2) that the student has the right not to 174 participate in singing the national anthem, reciting the pledge,

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or the moment of silence in s. 1003.45. Upon written request by

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his or her parent, the student must be excused from singing the 177 national anthem, reciting the pledge, including standing and 178 placing the right hand over his or her heart, or the moment of 179 silence in s. 1003.45. Each morning, before singing the national 180 anthem, reciting the pledge, and the moment of silence, a 181 moderator must announce that all excused students may leave the 182 classroom and stand outside the classroom door. Such students 183 must immediately return to the classroom after such activities. 184 5. Each school within a school district must comply with the requirements of this paragraph by October 1, 2025. A school 185 that is not in compliance with such requirements by such date, 186 187 shall receive a warning from the department to comply within 30 188 days. If the school fails to comply within the 30-day period, 189 the district school superintendent shall be officially 190 reprimanded by the department for the school's noncompliance. 191 The department shall refer the school district to the State 192 Board of Education. The state board has the sole authority to 193 further review the school's noncompliance and take any actions 194 deemed necessary until the school complies with the requirements 195 of this paragraph. 196 (b) Each school district shall conduct a public awareness 197 campaign about the display of the state motto, "In God We 198 Trust," in district schools and buildings pursuant to subsection 199 (4), the inclusion of a moment of silence at the beginning of each school day pursuant to s. 1003.45, and religious expression

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201	in public schools as authorized by general law.
202	(4) <u>(a)</u> Each district school board shall adopt rules to
203	require, in all of the schools of the district and in each
204	building used by the district school board, the display of the
205	state motto, "In God We Trust," designated under s. 15.0301, in
206	a conspicuous place.
207	(b) The state motto, "In God We Trust," must be displayed
208	on a 22 inch by 28 inch posterboard in a conspicuous location in
209	each school library, cafeteria, gymnasium, and main office. The
210	department shall provide the posterboards required under this
211	paragraph.
212	Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.

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
