48	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

50	Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Disaster-Affected
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#### 51 Voter Bill of Rights."

52 Section 2. Subsections (2) and (3) of section 101.733, 53 Florida Statutes, are amended, and subsections (4) through (8) 54 are added to that section, to read:

55 101.733 Election emergency; purpose; elections emergency 56 contingency plan; voter protections.-Because of the existing and 57 continuing possibility of an emergency or common disaster 58 occurring before or during a regularly scheduled or special 59 election, and in order to ensure maximum citizen participation in the electoral process and provide a safe and orderly 60 procedure for persons seeking to exercise their right to vote, 61 62 generally to minimize to whatever degree possible a person's exposure to danger during declared states of emergency, and to 63 64 protect the integrity of the electoral process, it is hereby 65 found and declared to be necessary to designate a procedure for the emergency suspension or delay and rescheduling of elections. 66

67 The Governor, upon consultation with the Secretary of (2) 68 State, shall reschedule any election suspended or delayed due to 69 an emergency. The election shall be held within 10 days after 70 the date of the suspended or delayed election or as soon 71 thereafter as is practicable. Notice of the election must be 72 published on the affected county's website as provided in s. 50.0311, on the affected municipality's website for municipal 73 74 elections, on the affected supervisor's website, or at least 75 once in a newspaper of general circulation in the affected area,

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and, where practicable, broadcast as a public service announcement on radio and television stations at least 1 week before the date the election is to be held. <u>The affected</u> <u>supervisor must also notify voters in his or her county through</u> <u>any other available and regularly used means of communication,</u> including social media, e-mail, telephone, and text message.

82 (3) The Division of Elections of the Department of State 83 shall adopt, by rule, an elections emergency contingency plan, which shall contain goals and policies that give specific 84 85 direction to state and local elections officials when an election has been suspended or delayed due to an emergency. The 86 87 contingency plan is a public record and must be presented to the Legislature each year in which federal or state elections are 88 89 being conducted. The contingency plan must shall be statewide in 90 scope and shall address, but not be limited to, the following 91 concerns:

92 (a) Providing a procedure for state and local elections
93 officials to follow when an election has been suspended or
94 delayed to ensure notice of the suspension or delay to the
95 proper authorities, the electorate, the communications media,
96 poll workers, and the custodians of polling places.

97 (b) Providing a procedure for the orderly conduct of a 98 rescheduled election, whether municipal, county, district, or 99 statewide in scope; coordinating those efforts with the 100 appropriate elections official, and the members of the governing

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101 body holding such election, if appropriate; and working with the 102 appropriate emergency management officials in determining the 103 safety of existing polling places or designating additional 104 polling places.

(c) Providing a procedure for the release and certification of election returns to the department for elections suspended or delayed and subsequently rescheduled under the provisions of ss. 101.731-101.74.

109 (4) To ensure that all voters are able to participate in 110 an election, the Secretary of State shall consider the emergency's impact on housing, transportation, utilities, 111 112 Internet access, the United States Postal Service, and accessibility needs, and proactively consult with the county 113 114 Supervisors of Elections as well as county emergency management 115 agencies, relevant county public services and utilities, social 116 services, and community-based nongovernmental organizations in 117 the affected jurisdictions. At a minimum, in any county that is 118 designated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency as 119 eligible for individual or public assistance or designated as 120 being in a state of emergency as declared by executive order or 121 proclamation issued by the Governor, a voter has the right to: 122 (a) Request, through telephonic means, in writing, or by 123 e-mail, a vote-by-mail ballot to be mailed to an address other 124 than the voter's address on file in the Florida Voter 125 Registration System without requiring the voter to complete the

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126 standard vote-by-mail request form. 127 (b) Have the voter's vote-by-mail ballot sent by 128 forwardable mail so a displaced voter who has provided a 129 forwarding address to the United States Postal Service does not 130 need to request a new ballot. 131 Return the voter's completed vote-by-mail ballot to (C) 132 the Supervisor of Elections in any county and have such 133 supervisor forward the ballot to the elections office in the 134 appropriate county. 135 (d) Drop the voter's completed vote-by-mail ballot off at any polling place or election office on the day of the election. 136 137 (e) Request a vote-by-mail ballot be mailed to the voter 10 days before election day and request that his or her vote-by-138 mail ballot be picked up during the early voting period without 139 140 the need for an emergency excuse. Have the voter's vote-by-mail ballot counted as long 141 (f) 142 as it is postmarked before or on the election day and received 143 by the Supervisor of Elections within 2 days after election day. 144 (q) Cure any issues with the voter's signature on the 145 vote-by-mail ballot by 5 p.m. on the 4th day after the election. 146 (h) Obtain accurate and timely information about disaster-147 related changes to the voter's voting options on a clearly and 148 prominently designated page on the Supervisor of Election's 149 website and on the appropriate municipal or county website for 150 municipal or county elections.

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151	(5) At a minimum, if a county is designated by the Federal
152	Emergency Management Agency as eligible for public or individual

175	(e) Update all emergency response websites this state may
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176	operate, including the Division of Elections and the Division of

180	user-friendly, written in plain language, publicly promoted,
181	updated in real-time, and remain on such websites through

Paragraphs (a), (b), and (d) of subsection (1) 354 of section 101.657, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 355 101.657 Early voting.-356 (1) (a) As a convenience to the voter, the supervisor of 357 elections shall allow an elector to vote early in the main or branch office of the supervisor. The supervisor shall mark, 358 359 code, indicate on, or otherwise track the voter's precinct for each early voted ballot. In order for a branch office to be used 360 361 for early voting, it must shall be a permanent facility of the 362 supervisor and shall have been designated and used as such for 363 at least 1 year before prior to the election. The supervisor may also designate any city hall, permanent public library facility, 364 365 fairground, civic center, courthouse, county commission building, stadium, convention center, government-owned senior 366 367 center, or government-owned community center as an early voting 368 site; however, if so designated, the sites must be 369 geographically located so as to provide all voters in the county 370 an equal opportunity to cast a ballot, insofar as is 371 practicable, and must provide sufficient nonpermitted parking to 372 accommodate the anticipated amount of voters. In addition, a supervisor may designate one early voting site per election in 373 374 an area of the county that does not have any of the eligible 375 early voting locations and, in accordance with s. 101.733, may

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376 designate early voting sites at locations that are otherwise 377 ineligible to be used for early voting. Such additional early 378 voting site must be geographically located so as to provide all voters in that area with an equal opportunity to cast a ballot, 379 380 insofar as is practicable, and must provide sufficient 381 nonpermitted parking to accommodate the anticipated amount of 382 voters. Each county shall, at a minimum, operate the same total 383 number of early voting sites for a general election which the 384 county operated for the 2012 general election. The results or tabulation of votes cast during early voting may not be made 385 386 before the close of the polls on election day. Results shall be 387 reported by precinct.

Except as provided in s. 101.733, the supervisor shall 388 (b) 389 designate each early voting site by no later than the 30th day 390 before prior to an election and shall designate an early voting 391 area, as defined in s. 97.021, at each early voting site. Except 392 as provided in s. 101.733, the supervisor shall provide to the division no later than the 30th day before an election the 393 394 address of each early voting site and the hours that early 395 voting will occur at each site.

(d) Early voting shall begin on the 10th day before an
election that contains state or federal races and, except as
<u>provided in s. 101.733</u>, end on the 3rd day before the election,
and shall be provided for no less than 8 hours and no more than
12 hours per day at each site during the applicable period. In

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401 addition, early voting may be offered at the discretion of the 402 supervisor of elections on the 15th, 14th, 13th, 12th, 11th, or 403 2nd day before an election that contains state or federal races 404 for at least 8 hours per day, but not more than 12 hours per 405 day. The supervisor of elections may provide early voting for elections that are not held in conjunction with a state or 406 407 federal election. However, the supervisor has the discretion to 408 determine the hours of operation of early voting sites in those 409 elections.
