A bill to be entitled

An act relating to mental health services for first responders; creating s. 394.4675, F.S.; providing definitions; requiring the Division of State Fire Marshal to develop and implement a statewide behavioral health access program to provide certain mental wellness services and resources to first responders; providing requirements for the program; providing that first responders are not required to pay a copayment for the services and resources; providing training requirements for licensed professional counselors; requiring the program, by a specified date, to develop a specified plan and submit the plan to the Legislature; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 394.4675, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

394.4675 Mental health services for first responders.—

- (1) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "First responder" has the same meaning as in s.

  112.1815(1) and includes 911 public safety telecommunicators as defined in s. 401.465(1)(a), correctional officers as defined in s. 943.10(2), and correctional probation officers as defined in s. 943.10(3).
- (b) "Licensed professional counselor" means a clinical psychologist, clinical social worker, marriage and family

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therapist, or mental health counselor authorized to provide services under s. 491.017 or a psychologist authorized to provide services under chapter 490.

- (2) (a) By engaging key stakeholders and partnerships with established nonprofit or state university first responder mental wellness initiatives, the Division of State Fire Marshal shall develop and implement a statewide behavioral health access program to provide comprehensive mental wellness services and resources with a focus on prevention and early intervention to reduce the prevalence of suicide and related mental health and substance abuse disorders for first responders. The program shall include all of the following:
- 1. Training on resiliency, mental health awareness, and posttraumatic growth.
  - 2. Developing and training of peer support teams.
- 3. Assisting first responder departments in building behavioral health access programs including internal mental wellness programs.
- 4. Establishing suicide prevention and mental health communication campaigns.
- 5. Integrating with partners for state disaster deployments under an emergency response plan.
- 6. Conducting statewide epidemiologic research on incidence and prevalence of suicide and mental health-related issues in this state.
- (b) First responders are not required to pay a copayment for the services and resources.
- (3) The program shall provide a statewide network of licensed professional counselors who meet additional training

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requirements and who are available to provide services to first responders, families of first responders, and retired first responders at routine, urgent, and crisis levels of care. The additional training must include training in trauma management and evidence-based suicide prevention modalities with first responders.

(4) By June 30, 2026, the program shall develop a research and evaluation plan to measure the effectiveness and return on investment of the program and submit the plan to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.
