34 331.303 Definitions.—

35 (15) "Quintimodal transportation hub" means a spaceport  
36 territory within which interconnected transportation facilities  
37 are available to move people or property by means of road,  
38 railroad, airport, seaport, and spaceport facilities.

39 (19) "Spaceport director or commander" means the  
40 individual designated by the governing body, agency, or military  
41 authority of a spaceport territory to administer the operations,  
42 maintenance, safety, and local agreements of that facility.

43 **Section 3. Subsections (16) and (17) of section 331.3051,**  
44 **Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (17) and (18),**  
45 **respectively, and a new subsection (16) is added to that section**  
46 **to read:**

47 331.3051 Duties of Space Florida.—Space Florida shall:

48 (16) In coordination with the Department of  
49 Transportation, metropolitan planning organizations, and local  
50 governments, enhance and promote the development and use of

51 quintimodal transportation hubs in this state.

52 **Section 4. Section 331.3052, Florida Statutes, is created**  
53 **to read:**

54 331.3052 Powers and duties of spaceport operators.—

55 (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this part,  
56 authority over the operational oversight, management, and day-  
57 to-day administration of each spaceport shall be vested in the  
58 spaceport director or commander for that facility.

59 (2) Space Florida shall be responsible for statewide  
60 strategic planning, financing, economic development, and  
61 intergovernmental coordination, but may not exercise direct  
62 control over local operational decisions unless:

63 (a) Specifically requested in writing by the spaceport  
64 director or commander; or

65 (b) Required to comply with applicable federal law or  
66 regulation.

67 (3) Each spaceport shall develop and maintain an  
68 operational governance plan consistent with Space Florida's  
69 statewide strategic plan. Such plan must be submitted annually  
70 to Space Florida, but is not subject to approval by Space  
71 Florida.

72 (4) Each spaceport shall maintain an updated list of  
73 spaceport site readiness development projects consistent with  
74 its operational governance plan and with Space Florida's  
75 spaceport master plan developed under s. 331.360. Such projects

76 include, but are not limited to, utility and commodity supply  
 77 extension, transportation infrastructure expansion,  
 78 environmental reviews, and similar activities that, if  
 79 completed, will support the future expansion of spaceport  
 80 operations and related space and hypersonic industry activities  
 81 including, but not limited to, payload processing, system  
 82 manufacturing, and testing. Such list must be submitted annually  
 83 to Space Florida.

84 (5) This section does not diminish Space Florida's  
 85 authority to finance, lease, or own spaceport facilities or to  
 86 coordinate economic development initiatives across multiple  
 87 spaceport territories.

88 (6) The powers and duties provided in this section do not  
 89 apply to federal property.

90 **Section 5. Paragraph (b) of subsection (2) of section**  
 91 **330.41, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:**

92 330.41 Unmanned Aircraft Systems Act.—

93 (2) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this act, the term:

94 (b) "Critical infrastructure facility" means any of the  
 95 following, if completely enclosed by a fence or other physical  
 96 barrier that is obviously designed to exclude intruders, or if  
 97 clearly marked with a sign or signs which indicate that entry is  
 98 forbidden and which are posted on the property in a manner  
 99 reasonably likely to come to the attention of intruders:

100 1. A power generation or transmission facility,

- 101 substation, switching station, or electrical control center.
- 102 2. A chemical or rubber manufacturing or storage facility.
- 103 3. A water intake structure, water treatment facility,
- 104 wastewater treatment plant, or pump station.
- 105 4. A mining facility.
- 106 5. A natural gas or compressed gas compressor station,
- 107 storage facility, or natural gas or compressed gas pipeline.
- 108 6. A liquid natural gas or propane gas terminal or storage
- 109 facility.
- 110 7. Any portion of an aboveground oil or gas pipeline.
- 111 8. A refinery.
- 112 9. A gas processing plant, including a plant used in the
- 113 processing, treatment, or fractionation of natural gas.
- 114 10. A wireless or wired communications facility, including
- 115 the tower, antennas, support structures, and all associated
- 116 ground-based equipment.
- 117 11. A seaport as listed in s. 311.09(1), which need not be
- 118 completely enclosed by a fence or other physical barrier and
- 119 need not be marked with a sign or signs indicating that entry is
- 120 forbidden.
- 121 12. An inland port or other facility or group of
- 122 facilities serving as a point of intermodal transfer of freight
- 123 in a specific area physically separated from a seaport.
- 124 13. An airport as defined in s. 330.27.
- 125 14. A spaceport territory as defined in s. 331.303 ~~s.~~

127 |       15. A military installation as defined in 10 U.S.C. s.  
128 | 2801(c)(4) and an armory as defined in s. 250.01.

129 |       16. A dam as defined in s. 373.403(1) or other structures,

131 | maintain or control the level of navigable waterways.

132 |       17. A state correctional institution as defined in s.  
133 | 944.02 or a contractor-operated correctional facility authorized  
134 | under chapter 957.

135 |       18. A secure detention center or facility as defined in s.  
136 | 985.03, or a moderate-risk residential facility, a high-risk  
137 | residential facility, or a maximum-risk residential facility as  
138 | those terms are described in s. 985.03(44).
