A bill to be entitled

An act relating to public records requests made to law enforcement officers; creating s. 119.101, F.S.; defining terms; prohibiting law enforcement officers from accepting and processing public records requests while engaged in certain activities; providing that a law enforcement officer makes a certain determination; requiring that a law enforcement officer verbally inform an individual of certain information; providing criminal penalties for individuals who knowingly and willfully persist in attempting to compel a law enforcement officer to accept and process a public records request under certain circumstances; providing applicability; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 119.101, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

119.101 Requests for public records made to law enforcement officers.—

(1) As used in this section, the term:

(a) "Employing agency" has the same meaning as in s. 943.10.

(b) "Law enforcement officer" has the same meaning as in s. 943.10.

(2) A law enforcement officer who is actively engaged in the performance of an official duty, including, but not limited to, a call for service, an investigation, a case-related

activity, or other official police activity, may not accept and process a public records request at such time.

- (a) For the purposes of this section, the determination of whether such officer is engaged in the performance of an official duty is made by the officer.
- (b) Upon the determination that the officer is engaged in the performance of an official duty, the officer must verbally inform the individual requesting public records that he or she cannot accept and process the public records request at that time and direct the individual to:
- 1. The custodian of records for the officer's employing agency; or
- 2. An official public records request online portal, if available.
- (c) An individual who, after being informed pursuant to paragraph (b), knowingly and willfully persists in attempting to compel a law enforcement officer to accept and process a public records request while such officer is engaged in the performance of an official duty commits the offense of obstruction of a law enforcement officer, in violation of s. 843.02.
- (3) This section does not apply to a law enforcement officer performing his or her official duties at an official location of the employing agency.
  - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2026.
